THE ATTENTION OF SOLDIERS ON FURLOUGH is directed to the following extracts from General Orders No. 161, series of 1863, and from General Orders No. 1, current series, Adjutant and Inspector General's office:

ADJ'T & INSP. GEN'L'S OFFICE,
RICHMOND, Oct. 29, 1864.
GENERAL ORDERS NO. 147.

H. Soldiers returning home on furlough, or on reaching places at which they will stay during furlough, will immediately report to the nearest Enrolling Office, who will keep a register of their names, descriptive list, place where stationed, by which the furlough was granted and the time at which it expires.

ADJ'T AND INSP. GEN'L'S OFFICE,
RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 6, 1865.
GENERAL ORDERS NO. 1.

Soldiers furloughed, who fail on their return home to report to the nearest Enrolling Office, as required by Paragraph 11, General Orders No. 141, 1863, will forfeit their furlough, be arrested by Enrolling Officers and returned to their commands as absentees without leave. Commanding officers will express this requirement and penalty upon the face of all furloughs thus issued.

A rigid compliance with the above orders will be enforced. All good citizens are requested to furnish the Enrolling Officer with any information which will assist him in placing in service all evaders of conscription and deserters or absconces from the army. All information with which he is furnished will be regarded as strictly confidential.
