CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA.

DISTRICT OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

THE UNDERSIGNED HAVING BEEN AP-
 pointed Receiver by the Hon. A. G. Magrath for the
 Districts of Fairfield, Kershaw and Sumter, would
 most respectfully announce to the citizens of the re-
 spective districts, that he is now prepared to dis-
 charge the duties that devolve upon him by virtue of
 said office.

I have no doubt that instances may arise where the
 duties properly discharged may be disagreeable to
 the parties interested, but relying upon the patriotism
 and loyalty of our citizens for their assistance in de-
 fending the provisions of the law, I shall expect such
 assistance to be cheerfully tendered, and in all cases
 that may arise, yield every consideration in my power,
 the nature of the case may admit of, to such persons
 as may be affected by its operation; in the mean time
 I shall endeavor to do my duty to the full extent and
 letter of the law, and abide the consequences. The
 Act of Confiscation on the part of the United States
 deprives our citizens of the property without hope of
 remuneration; the act of Sequestration based upon
 principles recognized by the civilized world is intend-
 ed to reimburse our citizens of the property thus de-
 creed to belong to our enemies.

I would therefore call upon all the citizens of the
 Districts aforesaid, to aid me by giving such informa-
 tion as they possess of any property, personal or real,
 that may belong to any citizen who may be recognized
 as an "Alien Enemy," also all indebtedness in any
 manner, shape or form, due or payable to citizens of
 the United States (except Maryland, Kentucky and
 Missouri) by the citizens of Fairfield, Kershaw and
 Sumter.

For the information of those who may be interested,
 I would respectfully call attention to the following
 provisions of the law:

1st. It shall be the duty of every citizen to give all
 the information he may possess to the proper officers
 of any lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chat-
 tels, rights and credits within the Confederacy, as held,
 owned, possessed or enjoyed by any one, for the use
 and benefit of any "alien enemy" since 21st May,
 1861.

2d. It shall be the duty of every Attorney, Agent,
 Partner or Trustee holding the property referred to, or
 having any interest therein for an alien enemy, to in-
 form the Receiver of the same, and to render a strict
 account thereof, and to place the same (as far as prac-
 ticable) in the hands of the said Receiver, whereupon
 such person shall be fully acquitted of all responsi-
 bility for property so reported.

3d. Any person failing to give such information and
 render such account shall be guilty of a high misde-
 meanor, and upon indictment and conviction shall be
 fined in a sum not exceeding \$5000, and imprisoned
 not longer than six months, and shall further be liable
 to pay double the value of such property held by him
 or subject to his control.

NOTE.—All persons who have a domicile within the
 States with which this Government is at war, no mat-
 ter whether they be subjects of Great Britain, France,
 or any neutral nation, or whether they be citizens of
 the U. S. or not, if they have a domicile or carry on
 any trade, traffic, or business within such boundaries,
 they are to be recognized as Alien Enemies under the
 law.

A PROCLAMATION.

BY THE GOVERNOR.



RESOLVED, THAT THE GOVERNOR, IN THE
 event of the invasion of the State, or if, in his
 judgment, the State should be in imminent danger of
 invasion before the next meeting of this General As-
 sembly, be authorized to call for companies of volun-
 teers, and organize them into battalions and regiments,
 in such manner as in his judgment may be most expe-
 dient for the defence of the State.—Resolutions of the
 last General Assembly.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, }
 HEADQUARTERS, November 11, 1861. }

Under the above resolutions I will receive com-
 panies of infantry, with 76 men, at the Fair Grounds in
 Columbia, and form them into Battalions and Regi-
 ments immediately: Provided, they come with arms,
 such as they can procure, fit for active service, (as I
 can promise no arms,) and supplied with four day's
 provisions. None need present themselves unless they
 have arms. They will be ordered to report for duty to
 the Confederate General commanding at or near
 Charleston, and will be considered as enlisted for
 special service, as a reserve, for the defence of the
 State. Although they may be received into Confed-
 erate service, yet it will be under a special act, passed
 August 21, 1861, entitled "an act to provide for local
 defence and special service."

In the present emergency it is hoped that every
 man will do his duty and act immediately. Col. F. W.
 McMaster will be assigned the duty of receiving these
 companies and organizing them at the Fair Grounds.
 All companies ready to march for this rendezvous
 will immediately notify him at Columbia.
