Abstract of an Act.

TO INCORPORATE AND ESTABLISH A BANK IN THE TOWN OF HAMBURG.

SEC. 1st. Be it enacted by the Honourable, the Senate and House of Representatives now met and sitting in general assembly, and by the authority of the same, That in order to establish a bank in the town of Hamburg, the following persons be, and they are hereby appointed commissioners to receive subscriptions at the several places hereafter mentioned.

SEC. 3d. That in case a greater sum than three hundred thousand dollars be subscribed, the commissioners above named at Hamburg, shall in apportioning said shares, give preference to the subscriptions of the 1st day, and in no instance reduce any subscription below five shares, unless they cannot otherwise sufficiently reduce the amount subscribed. That the capital stock of said bank, shall be divided into six thousand shares of fifty dollars each share, that twelve dollars and fifty cents in specie, shall be paid on each share at the time of subscribing, and that twelve dollars and fifty cents, also in specie, be paid (being second instalment) on the first Monday in March next, and that twelve dollars and fifty cents, also in specie, be paid on the first Monday in November next, and that twelve dollars and fifty cents, also in specie, be paid on the fourth and last instalment, be paid on the first Monday in December next, and all shares on which the payment due shall not be punctually made, on the days above mentioned, shall be forfeited with whatever money may have been paid thereon.

SEC. 22. And the said corporation are hereby authorized to increase their capital to a sum not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars.
