Bridges, arrived at New Orleans, on the 28th ult., from Metamoras, reports that active preparations were making by the Mexicans for another descent upon Texas-that the Commissioners who were sent to Metamores to treat for an exchange of prisoners, had been arrested by the Mexican authorities and confined in prison, and all overtures for an acknowledgment of Texian Independence peremptorily refused. Capt. Bridges also reports, that the Mexicans had 4000 troops at Metamoras, 4000 at the Nucces and 6000 at Salvillo, all burning to meet the Texian rifle again. The Texians were also making preparations to give their invaders a searm reception, both by sea and land. The troops were to march for the Rio Grande to meet the enemy.
