Doctor BREVARD was one of the alumni of the South Carolina College, and his character, as well as his demeanor, was in that institute n and in early years, such as it was in subsequent life. His perevering devotion to knowledge was unusual, he was understandingly familiar with his library, and hence, to a sound mind, he added the embellishments of literary cultivation. Though he never employed his intellectual treasures to minister to that poor, but too common vanity, that covets the idie admiration of the multitude, yet they were not unknown to his more intimate associates. Utterly exempt from that equally poor ambition which seeks as an end, popular applause and public station, Brevard s excellencies were somewhat withdrawn from the gaze of the buzy world, and his characteristic modesty rendered them rather of a personal and domestic character. Such was the impression which his character made upon the writer, and such was the last remaining son of Judge Joseph Brevard Long will his memory be hallowed in the tenderest affections of those who knew him best.
