As they are the finest cotton lands in the world, not subject to overflow oftener than once in ten years, capitalists will purchase them, being fully assured that they will steadily enhance in value, and in proportion as the country recovers from the effects of war and the depression in the labor system incident to emancipation.

**NEXT COTTON CROP.**—Advices from the interior of Louisiana indicate that the people, though disappointed in crops this season, the worst for twenty years, to the breadth of land planted, are about to start early for the crop of 1867. It is likely that less land will be planted, partly for want of reliable labor, and partly for want of means, but there will be more diversified farming. The greatest quietude seems to exist as to political matters, which are hardly alluded to even by party papers.

**ARREST.**—One Samuel Harper was arrested near Pendleton, on Friday last, for passing counterfeit coin. He represented himself as a Virginian, says he was lately engaged in the employ of a tobacco trader through this country, that he bought the coin with greenbacks in North Carolina. Upon a hearing of the case, the Court ordered that he be admitted to bail in the sum of three hundred dollars for his appearance at court. As yet he is in the custody of the Sheriff, having failed to give the required security.—Anderson Appeal.

**THE CROPS OF 1867.**—Cotton factors in New Orleans have advised correspondents in the country that it is unwise to make any preparation to plant Cotton with the negroes or any other kind of labor, until the course which Congress is about to pursue becomes settled and its effects may be prognosticated. The sentiment of very great hopelessness as to the future prevails in that community.

**Hogs.**—We have had one or two droves to come to Greenville the present season. They are from Tennessee, and are very good sized, and fair condition. The lowest price asked, as far as understood, is eleven cents per pound, gross, with but few buyers. They go below.

Montgomery demanded the surrender of Clemens, and on his refusal, a fight ensued, in which Clemens was killed, and one of the bushwackers mortally wounded. Montgomery has arrested several of the most prominent secessionists, and holds them as hostages for the safety of loyal citizens.
