The General Assembly, by a concurrent resolution passed December 13th, have extended the time for the collection of the taxes for the fiscal year commencing November 1, 1888, and ending October 31, 1889, without penalty, to February 1, 1890, in all the counties of the State.

TAX RETURNS, 1889-90.

Auditor's Office, Kershaw Co., Camden, S. C., Dec., 10th, '89.
The Books for receiving Tax Returns for the fiscal year 1889-1890, will open at this Office, on the 1st day of January next, and will be kept open daily (Sundays excepted) until the 20th day of February following. The year 1890 is the regular time for making a re-assessment of Real Estate.

All persons liable for taxes individually or otherwise. As Owner, Holder, Husband, Parent, Guardian, Trustee, Executor, Administrator, Receiver, Accounting Officer, Agent, Attorney or Factor are required to make returns to the Auditor within the time prescribed by law, to wit, from January 1st to February 20th, 1890.

Full and complete returns of all taxable property, Real and Personal owned or held on the first day of January, 1890. Must be listed, specifying number of Acres and Value, number of Town Lots and Value, number of Buildings and Value. Also, a schedule of Personal Property consisting of number of Horses and Mules, Cattle, Sheep and Goats, Hogs, Dogs, Watches, Gold and Silver Plate, Pianos, Melodeons or Organs, Vehicles of all descriptions. Average Value of Merchandise, Materials used as a Manufacturer, Machinery, Engines, Implements, Tools &c. Money on hand, Value of Credits, Value of Investments in Bonds not exempt from Taxation, House Hold Furniture, Plantation Tools and Implements.

Male persons 21 years of age and not 50 are liable to a Poll Tax of \$1.00 (Except they are disqualified from disability or otherwise) must make returns whether they own property or not.

All returns must be made on the proper blanks furnished by the State, and sworn to according to law. Such returns for Real Estate "Same as last return" will not be received.

All Delinquents who fail to make returns within the time prescribed, will have 50 per cent. penalty added to their last returns, and no rebate will be allowed when taxes are to be paid.
