**Charleston Elections.**

What does the middle mean, into which our Charleston neighbors have stumbled? Upon what question are they making their fight? Is Republicanism, or Democracy, or either, or both, or which, in any way connected with it? What is the issue? Not that it is a matter of much importance to us the up country members of the first circuit, but really matters are so mixed up, that from mere curiosity we are led to the enquiry, upon what issues will the coming election be decided? All party lines appear to be wiped out, the terms Republican or Democrat appear to have no significance whatever, and as it appears to us the simple preference as between Cunningham and Waganer, will alone decide the casting of the coming vote, what do you mean gentlemen? Will the *Times* and *Courier* please rise to explain.

**Temperance.**

Just at this particular junction of affairs, we feel that a few words in relation to this subject will not be out of place. As generally accepted it relates to the abstaining from the use of intoxicating liquors, or at least is construed to mean that by the advocates of total abstinence, and here we would say, that nothing we now write is intended to reflect upon or oppose a "temperance organization" of any kind whatever, they are all intended for good, and as a general thing work to that end, and may always count upon our cordial and hearty support, when, limited to the legitimate ends of a "temperance society" as opposed to the injurious use of liquors. We agree that they have a sturdy but noble fight before them, a high and honorable mission, so long as it is confined to the proper and lawful efforts against "king alcohol." But the world in general, and we agree fully with it, does not limit the meaning of the word temperance simply to the abstinence from alcoholic drink, but there are other interpretations inculcating as high, if not higher, lessons of morality that it impresses upon us. We should be "temperate" in judging of the actions and motives of our friends and fellow men, temperate in deciding as to whether they are actually doing wrong or not, temperate in deciding what course should be pursued if they are acting contrary to our ideas of right or wrong, temperate in the public expression of our opinion of them. Temperance does not go out among us with a rule in her hand, prepared to utterly condemn every one who does not come up to her arbitrary and precise requirements. True, temperance is reasonable, prudent, just, lenient, non-obtrusive and non-offensive. Whenever it assumes the aggressive [otherwise than against the use of liquors] it at once becomes "intemperance." In our daily intercourse, "temperance" teaches us to be polite and respectful, to cautiously avoid any indiscreet or hasty, or intemperate expression, or in fact the use of any "intemperate" language, not only "temperance" teaches that, but all that go to make up "temperance" impresses it forcibly upon us, politeness, self-respect, a kind heart, good nature, good breeding, all join to give to the true gentleman, a character for real "temperance" that the obtrusive, enthusiastic, one idea'd member of the "temperance society" can never obtain. He cannot be intemperate in several respects, to enforce temperance in one. And in the unavailing effort to do so, must only bring discredit upon the cause he would advance, and which is so dear to many an anxious heart. The temperance cause has within the past few years, spread with amazing rapidity. Upon its own merit it must continue its success, but mem-

bers who are "intemperate" in the broad sense of the word, must necessarily retard its course. "Be ye temperate in all things," is a command that is binding upon us all, and the man who use intemperate language and with intemperate haste, judges and condemns his fellow man, is fully as guilty of real Intemperance as the one who puts the wine cup to his lips.
