HOWE'S BIG CIRCUS.

Yesterday morning will long be remembered by the citizens of Memphis, as it gave to them a street pageant which so far exceeded that of any Circus ever in our city as to remind us of the Mardi-Gras turnouts, concerning which our readers are so well posted. In point of artistic merit, brilliant equipage, novelty of design and variety of interest, to say nothing of its magnitude, the street display of Howe's London circus and menagerie yesterday was superior to any effort of the kind ever witnessed in this city. In realistic effect and impression the features of yesterday's procession command the praise of all who beheld its sparkling line, and will elicit most favorable comment from the most critical of the spectators, those whose aesthetic culture and high appreciation of such subjects enables them to recognize its excellence and merit. The procession started at half-past nine o'clock, and by the time it turned into Main street the walks of this thoroughfare was densely packed with interested spectators. The crowd at Court square and vicinity was so large that it was difficult for pedestrians to move from one point to another. In fact, as the procession came by, the people in their eager delight rushed up close to the chariots, cages and horses, as if impelled with a desire to seize hold of whatever they could lay their hands on. We have not seen such an outpouring of the people since the last Mardi-Gras, and

were pleasantly reminded of that great occasion by the general enthusiasm and wild joy that seized both the old and the young yesterday when witnessing the magnificent pageant. It is no easy task to give a just and merited description of the pageant; it was something above and beyond the usual ostentations of a circus, for it exhibited both taste and elegance, and illustrated much which the generality of people would naturally admire as they would appreciate it, but which only the educated can appreciate, justly, as they would comprehend its characters properly. It was a noticeable fact that the pageant attracted the *bon ton* of our city, for numerous indeed were the private carriages containing elegant ladies, pretty children and wondering old people, whose hearts were gladdened by the exhibition.—*Memphis Appeal*, Sept. 14th.

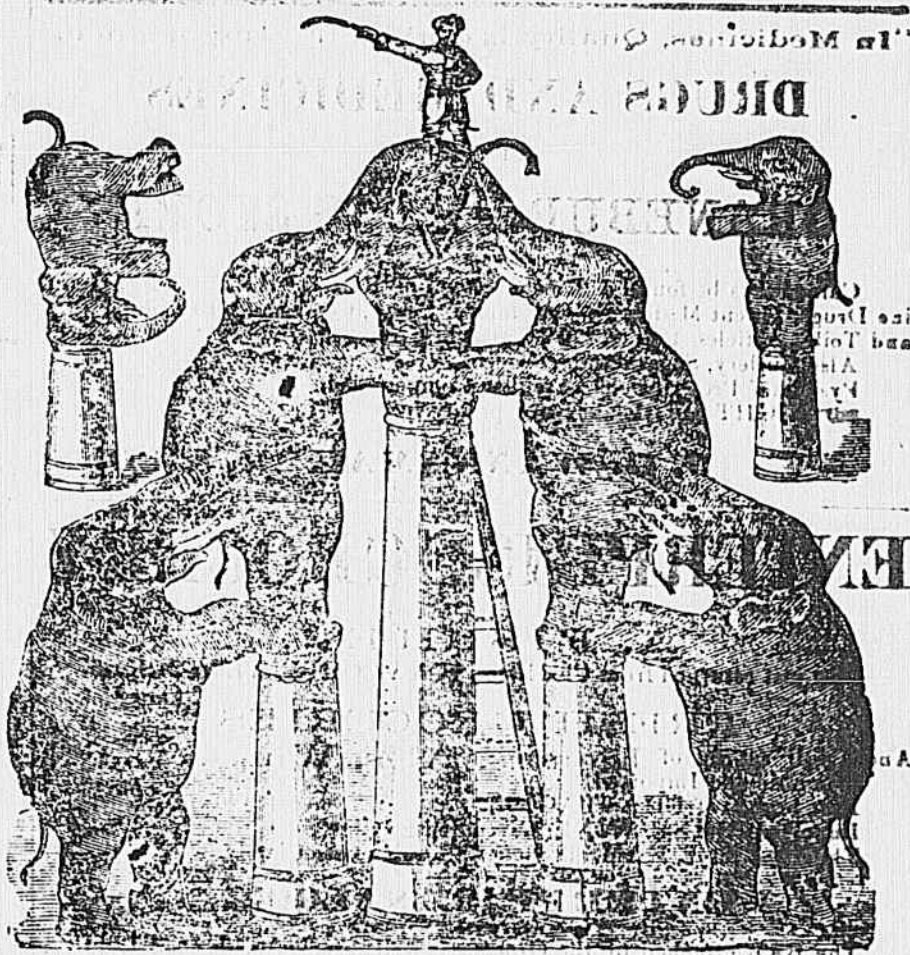
