The supreme court of the United States, on the next decision day, will probably render its opinion on the constitutionality of the enforcement act of 1870, which congress passed to protect the colored voters of the south, and under the sixth section of which numerous arrests and imprisonments have been made. The case before the court is known as the Grant (Louisiana) parish cases, where some eighty persons were arrested for "conspiring, combining and confederating" to deprive certain citizens of the United States of the exercise of the elective franchise. Some of the defendants were convicted on several counts of the indictment, but, on a motion for arrest of judgment, and on an appeal to the United States circuit court, Associate Justice Bradley and Circuit Judge Wood were divided in opinion, and on this division the case comes up to the supreme court on the constitutionality of the act of congress. The case was elaborately argued at the last term, and the decision is awaited with much interest.

From the way folks vote down that way it will be necessary to educate enough people up to the straightout democratic standard to support it. Furnish the straightout democrats, and straightout democratic papers will spring up and flourish in every town in the state. We are pleased to see it stated that Gov. Chamberlain will be in attendance upon the Fair. His visit here will be a source of satisfaction to many who have supported his administration since his inauguration. Besides, his intermingling with the people of Greenville will, we think, tend to strengthen him in the support of our good class of citizens. He is to be introduced to the audience at the Fair by Col. S. S. Crittenden.—*Greenville News.*
