Miscellaneous News.

A large number of cotton-seed-oil factories are being erected in Georgia.

The Centennial Exhibition is to be kept open unofficially, as long as a paying attendance is secured.

The cholera is killing a large number of hogs in several counties in Iowa.

Richard O'Keefe killed John Fitzsimmons, in New York, last week, by thrusting an umbrella in his eye.

Peter Dessan & Co., one of the oldest and most respected firms of stock brokers in New York, have failed.

The professional duck-hunters, (i. e. those who kill ducks for the market) hire whole lakes in California, and thus keep off amateurs and rival professionals.

Thirteen Mormon missionaries left New York for England, last week, and about sixty others will shortly leave Utah and go to different parts of the United States, to make converts.

Dr. John Dove, for over thirty years Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, and an eminent Mason of fifty years standing, died recently in Richmond.

The Legislature of North Carolina stands—Senate, Democrats, 32 majority; House, Democrats, 51 majority.

The sugar crop of Louisiana is estimated at 200,000 hogheads, and this is said to be equal to only one-eighth of the amount consumed in the United States.

The tenth annual session of the National Grange is now holding in Chicago. John T. Jones, of Arkansas, is in the chair. Nearly every State is represented.

The Roan Mountain Republican, published in Mitchell, North Carolina, speaking of the late election, pathetically says, "We have met the enemy, and they are there."

The Georgia papers report several instances of the mobbing of colored Democrats by the Radical roughs. This ought not to be longer permitted.

The President has pardoned William O. Avery, the whiskey ring convict, and the friends of McKee, another of this ring, are confident that he also will be out in a few days.

John Merissey has deposited \$3,000,000 of pool money with one of the New York trust companies, and it is estimated that at least \$5,000,000 is depending in the various States on the result of the Presidential election.

A company of Shoshones have been regularly enlisted as United States soldiers, and sent to join Crook's command. They are a fine body of fighting men, and will give the Sioux a good limit of their prowess when they meet them.

A man by the name of James H. Johnston living near Beattie's Ford, North Carolina, has mysteriously disappeared. He took part in a torch-light procession in Charlotte, a few evenings ago, since when he has been neither seen nor heard from.

Mr. G. W. App, of Atlanta, Ga., has just finished a remarkable pair of shoes. Their length is seventeen and three-fourths inches and they are six inches across the sole. They were built for a colored man in Arkansas, who is over seven feet in height and weighs 400 pounds.

The Alabama Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church has been divided into the Alabama Conference and the Central Alabama Conference—the former embracing the white members, and the latter the colored.

Reports from the Alabama, the Mississippi and the South Carolina cotton crops show that the late fine weather has been improved by clean and early gathering. The yield, however, is less than last year's.

An extensive fire broke out in the yard of the Central Railroad, in Savannah, Georgia, a few days ago. The flames were first discovered on a train of cotton standing in the yard. By the side of this train there was another, also loaded with cotton, which in close proximity was a store house in which were 100 bales. Besides these, at least 10,000 bales were standing on end in the yard. The wind being high, the fire soon communicated itself to the second train and storehouse, both of which were utterly destroyed, and only the superhuman exertions of the fire department, employees of the road and bystanders prevented the whole vast amount of cotton stored in the yard from meeting the same fate. About 1,800 bales of cotton were totally burned, and 250 damaged.

South Carolina News.

Laurens wants a good barber of Democratic proclivities.

There has been a heavy frost in Abbeville county.

Diphtheria prevails to an alarming extent in Sumter and Camden.

Locusts recently made their appearance in considerable numbers in Columbia.

There was an earthquake in Rock Hill last week. At least, so says the Hampton Herald.

Dr. A. Walker, an old and highly respected citizen of Dark Corner township in Anderson county, died last week from paralysis.

Judge Carpenter and the Edgefield bar have concluded not to hold the court for that county this term.

All the United States troops quartered at Edgefield have left, to seek death and glory somewhere else.

Four negroes who attempted to rob the house of Mr. Wm. Ross, near Barnwell, were intimidated by that gentleman's resort to the shotgun policy.

Mr. Benj. J. Curran, a leading citizen of Laurens, died at his residence in the Waxhaws, last week, after a brief illness of bilious fever.

The Lexington Dispatch thinks there will be no need of wood or coal this winter in the Senate chamber—Gen. Gary will keep things warm.

Mr. John G. Thomasson, a young man about eighteen years of age, was killed in York county last week by being kicked in the forehead by a mule.

A number of enthusiastic Edgefield citizens have ordered a superb reception chair for General Hampton, to be used by him during his term of office. The chair will be carried to Columbia by a delegation of one thousand "boys" from Edgefield.

The gin house of Mr. W. R. Flud, of Wedgefield, in Sumter county, was lately burned—loss, thirteen bales of cotton belonging to Mr. Flud, and six or seven bales belonging to other parties.

The gin house of Dr. Thomas J. DuBose, near Mechanicsville, in Sumter county, was destroyed by fire a short time ago. Loss—gin house, one bale of packed cotton, and one bale in the seed.

The engine on the Anderson branch of the G. & C. R. R. now dies a Hampton flag, and is adorned with a large and beautiful wreath on each side, one bearing the inscription, "Hampton" and the other, "Fidelity."

The dwelling-house and kitchen of Capt. R. Z. Harles, near Marion, were burned last week, and Capt. Harles was shot at twice while attempting to stop the progress of the fire. The kitchen was burned to the ground, and only through superhuman efforts was his residence saved.

The dwelling-house and out-houses of Mr. Charles Folk, who lived on Broad River, about twelve miles above Columbia, were entirely destroyed by fire a few days ago. Mrs. Folk and her baby barely escaped. This unfortunate family lost everything they possessed in the world, including money, live stock, clothing, vehicles, etc.

W. H. Rutherford, who had been sent as a messenger with the election returns from Laurens county, would not give up the returns to the board of canvassers, and apparently could not be induced to do so. He alleged as his reason that he had heard that one of the precinct boxes was broken open. He was arrested on Friday last, and turned over to a trial justice. He gave up the returns.

Mr. J. Byrd Riley, of Abbeville county, was brutally murdered a short time since by a colored man named Bluford Jones, at the house of the latter. The deceased was shot in the stomach by Jones, and after he had fallen, his head was mashed in with a poker. The next day Jones and his family were captured and brought to Abbeville by a squad of United States soldiers, and lodged in jail to await trial.

The jail at Barnwell was burned on last Monday morning about 1 o'clock. It is supposed to have been fired by the prisoners confined there in. The late hour at which the fire occurred, and the rapid headway it made, rendered all efforts to save the jail fruitless, and it was entirely consumed. The doors were thrown open by the jailor, and the prisoners all escaped.

Mr. Hartley, of Batesburg, and his son, Curran Hartley, were both dangerously cut, last week, by a negro residing on Mr. Hartley's place. This negro had threatened to kill a colored Democrat, and Mr. Hartley determined to order him off his place. He therefore went down to the negro's house, unarmed, when the negro rushed at him with a knife, and inflicted several serious cuts. Curran Hartley about this time came to the relief of his father, when the black desperado made at him; they clinched, and young Mr. Hartley received a deep gash in the neck, before he could draw a pistol. He succeeded in doing so, however, and barely escaping with his life, he shot the fiend through the head. Both father and son are doing well.

Cato Lewis, a colored deputy marshal at Lewis Turnout in Chester county, is now in jail under a charge of an attempt to intimidate voters on election day.

The Man to Live Long.
