The Situation in Columbia.

When our last issue was published, the situation in Columbia was as follows: The Supreme Court had issued a peremptory mandamus to the Board of State Canvassers, ordering them to issue certificates to those candidates—except for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor—appearing on the face of the returns to be elected.

On Wednesday morning, while the Supreme court had before it the entire matter, and while Corbin, the counsel for the Board, was asking for time, the Board met, declared all the Radical candidates for State officers elected, and ordered certificates of election to be given to all the members elect of the Legislature, except those from Edgefield and Laurens.

They corrected the mistakes in the commissioners' returns, with regard to Dunn and Tolbert, but left untouched those with respect to Conner and Maise. Having done these things, the Board, about noon on Wednesday, the 22nd inst., adjourned sine die!
