Since the State Democratic convention met in Columbia in May and adopted the new primary rules requiring a new enrollment of the voters of the state, the newspapers have been untiring in their efforts to get the people to enroll. Rarely have we seen a paper published in the state that did not contain a notice to the voters that enrollment was necessary this year. The subject has been discussed on the street, at the cross roads store, in the home and at every place where the people gather. If any man has failed to put his name on the club roll, he can't lay the blame on somebody else. If he has been too indifferent to enroll, he would have been in all probability too indifferent to vote in the primary. The vote in the August primary will be several thousand less than two years ago, not because anybody has been disfranchised but because repeaters and dead men will not vote.

ple will demand that the candidates say whether they are for Blease or not. There is no good reason for this. The candidates should have reasons for asking for the votes of the people, and if a man can give no excuse other than that he is for or against Blease, he has no claims on the votes of the people and should be defeated. They should tell where they stand on the important issues demanding legislature in South Carolina, and let the people know what to expect of them. If a man favors compulsory education and intends to vote for it, if elected, he should tell the people, and on the other hand, if he is opposed to it, he should say so. A candidate should not tell who he is so much as what he will do.

Let the candidates tell what they favor, if anything, and what they oppose.

## Austria and Servia Will Fight.

London, July 26.—Today's developments appear to furnish new proof that Austria is determined to make war on Servia. The possibilities of a general European war seem greater than ever have confronted the present generation.

The Servian reply to the Austro-Hungarian ultimatum was an acceptance of almost all the imperious demands, except that Austrian officials shall participate in the investigation and fix the responsibility for the anti-Austrian propaganda. Servia proposed an appeal to the Powers at The Hague for the settlement of that feature.

Notwithstanding this humiliating surrender, which was more than Europe expected of the proud little Nation, the Austrian Government today gave the Servian Minister his passports, which may be construed as a virtual declaration of war.

## Who Is W. F. Stevenson

For what does he stand notoriously? First, for economy. Do you know that congress in the last two years has spent \$352,000,000 on creeks and rivers and harbors? This has not helped the people of the Fifth District one penny. South Carolina's share of that money according to population would be \$18,000,000.00. If they had put that on our post roads instead of in creeks and harbors and rivers every man in South Carolina would have a good road at hand. During that term our whole State government has cost only \$20,000,000.00. We would have about two and a half times as much for our roads as it takes to run the whole State government, and instead of its being used to benefit our roads it has been dumped into creeks and rivers and harbors, and almost none of it has been seen in South Carolina. They have just passed a bill through the house carrying \$80,000,000.00 and the senate will add to it. Stevenson says, cut down "that steal," as Ben Tillman calls it and build roads to the farmers' doors.

What does the farmer say about this? Give Stevenson a chance, and he will do his best, not only to "put the Fifth district on the map," but to put the farmers of the fifth district on the map also.
