Mr. S. W. Watts has accepted a position with D. E. Clark & Co.

Mr. W. C. Nicholson, who has been with D. E. Clark & Co. several months, has returned to his home at Jefferson.

The 8-months-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Sullivan, of Jefferson, Route 4, died of cholera infantum Friday, and was buried at Fork Creek about 10 o'clock Saturday.

Mrs. H. H. Evans returned from a hospital in Charlotte Friday, where she had gone for treatment for cancer of the stomach. She is no better.

The first bale of new cotton sold in the State was bought at Lilesville yesterday for fifteen cents a pound, says the Monroe Journal. It was raised by Mr. E. P. Liles.

The graded school here will be converted in all probability into a State High school, which will entitle the school to \$480 State aid annually in addition to the funds already available.

We go to press late this week, as it was impossible to get the primary returns early enough to meet the mails. The returns are yet incomplete, but a good idea may be formed from the figures in this issue.

Mr. L. R. Broom received a telegram Saturday night that his sister, Mrs. Vera Helms, of near Monroe, was dangerously ill. He hurried off Sunday morning, but found when he reached her home that there had been a mistake, for Mrs. Helms and all the family were in excellent health and knew nothing of the matter.

Messrs. Miller and C. A. Baker had a very serious accident Monday afternoon, when Mr. Miller's car turned turtle. Mr. Miller is very badly wounded, while Mr. Baker's wounds are nothing serious he is pretty badly scratched up.—Jeffersonian.

Mr. J. A. Arant, as is his custom, had the first bale of cotton ready for the market in this section. He was ready to have it ginned on Thursday, August 20th, but there was no market for it. He tried to sell in Monroe but was offered only eight cents and he refused to sell for that price.

The examinations for postmaster for fourth class offices were held in the counties all over the State last Saturday. Rev. J. W. Quick had no opposition for the office at Pageland, L. S. Graves none for Ruby, J. Carroll Miller none for Jefferson and Miss Aleine Rowe none for Middendorf. A Mr. Curtis is trying for A. J. Raley's place as postmaster at McBee.

The residence of Mr. Thos. Watts just south of town was destroyed by fire about three o'clock Monday morning. It was a nearly new 4-room house. Very little was saved from the building as the fire had gained much headway before it was discovered. The fire started in the cook room and the origin is unknown, as there had been no fire in the stove since Sunday morning. There was \$600 insurance.

The six-weeks-old child of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Parker was the victim of a serious accident Saturday morning when Mrs. Parker tripped and fell as she alighted from a carriage at Chesterfield, where she had gone to visit her sister, Mrs. I. P. Man gum. She fell on the child and its skull was fractured and its body bruised. It was carried to Dr. Brenizer at Charlotte for treatment, and its condition was such that it could be brought home Sunday. It is now improving. Mrs. Parker sustained painful bruises when she fell.

In Union county's second primary last Saturday M. C. Long and J. C. M. Vann were nominated for representative; H. B. Adams, jr. for recorder and Jas. Winchester for cotton weigher at Monroe.

Prof. G. B. Dukes, of Cokesburg, S. C. has been elected principal of the Pageland school. He is a graduate of Wofford college and has had seven years experience as a teacher. He was formerly principal of Hyatt Park school in Columbia. He comes highly recommended by the State Department of Education. He taught in Bennettsville two or three years and was a member of the county board of education while in that county. He is a married man and will move his family here.

Mr. Charles T. Connors, for 15 years editor of the Lancaster News, died at his home in Lancaster last Thursday, after an illness of more than a year with bright's disease. He was 59 years old, and spent most of his life in Lancaster where he was born. He represented his county in the State legislature for two terms. He was one of the best loved citizens of the county, and had more real friends possibly than any other man. He was always courteous, kind, and thoughtful. He is survived by a wife and several sons and daughters.

The new rural route to be established from Pageland on October 1st will be 14.81 miles long and will pay \$660 salary. There will be, it seems now, less than seventy-five applicants for the job as carrier. The route will run by W. W. Jenkins', Mott Deese's, Providence church, G. D. Mangum's old home, Evans' Mill, J. W. Graves' old home, S. I. Evans' old farm and into the Jefferson road at Fork creek, and thence back to Pageland. Jefferson Route 1 will be turned back by White Plains and W. J. Hicks' store and up the new road and into the Lancaster road between J. C. Sanders' and W. E. Courtney's.

The institute for farmers held in the grove near the old bank building last Saturday was attended by a fairly good crowd of farmers and a few of the ladies. Profs. Hutchinson and Niven, of Clemson College, were the speakers of the day. Each was given a respectful hearing and the farmers manifested much interest in the subjects discussed. Plain talks were made about soils and their needs, money and the ways to get it from the farm, fruits and how to grow them and many other interesting subjects. W. J. Tiller stated that he had contracted for ten thousand pounds of vetch seed for the farmers of the county, but said the price is advancing and he is having trouble in getting the seed at the right price. He asks the farmers to act together and aid him in getting the seed.

Big Majority For Smith

Smith Goes In Over All.

A long distance message direct from Columbia this afternoon at 3 o'clock just before we close the forms gives the election returns as follows:

Blease 51,000, Jennings 2,000, Pollock 2,000 and Smith 69,000. These figures are given in round numbers and are subject to slight changes. The entire vote reported to this time is about 125,000, with from 15,000 to 25,000 votes yet to be heard from.

It is almost certain that Smith will win over all his opponents by a good majority. The votes yet to be reported will not change the standing of the candidates materially.

Cooper, Manning and Richards are running close together, with Cooper about 200 votes in the lead.
