Thomas, at one time pastor of the Baptist church in this city, but when he died editor-in-chief and publisher of The Baptist Courier, the literary organ of the Baptist denomination of South Carolina, diea at Greenville Saturday afternon at 5:25 o'clock, after an illness of several weeks. Dr. Thomas had been in declining health for the past several years, and since the latter part

Dr. Thomas went from Furman to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, where he graduated in 1879. Soon after his election he was chosen as a delegate from the ordained June 24, 1877.

His first pastorate was at Batesburg, where he labored from 1880 to 1883. For the next four years he was pastor of the First Baptist church of Charleston. From 1887 to Mr. P. W. Shuler Passes Away-Fire 1891 he filled a pastorate at Orangeburg, leaving there in 1891 to become editor of The Baptist Courier.

Dr. 'I'homas has received almost every gift of honor in the power of the Baptist denomination of South Carolins. In 1885 he was elected secretary of the State Baptist convention, a position which he held until 1894.

of South Carolina. He was made president of the State Convention in 1907, serving in that capacity two years.

For many years he was a member of the State missionary board and of the boards of trustees of Southern Baptist Theological seminary and of Benedict College at Columbia.


