FLETCHER'S DIETARY GOLDEN RULE.

Here is Horace Fletcher's dietary golden rule for all seasons of the year:

Do not eat when you are mad or sad, only when you are glad.

The researches of the scientists have proved that our nerves play a most important part in our digestion. Many emotions actually stop short the flow of gastric juices as effectively as an angry landlord might shut off the gas or water from the flat of the tenant who had angered him. These emotions inhibit, or forbid, the action of certain glands from which should flow the needed digestive fluids. If you are worried or angry over a business deal or home trouble—over anything, in fact—you had better not eat at all just then, for worry and anger are potent factors in stopping the flow of the gastric juices.

Chew Liquid Food Too.

The increased amount of liquids consumed during the summer months renders the following advice of Horace Fletcher of additional importance at this time of the year. The famous expert on foods claims that LIQUIDS SHOULD BE "CHEWED"—that is, insalivated—as well as solids. He says: "Adult man was not originally intended to take his nourishment in a liquid form; consequently all liquids having taste, such as soup, milk, tea, coffee, cocoa and the various forms of alcohol, must be treated as solid foods and insalivated by holding them in the mouth, moving the tongue gently, with straight up and down masticatory movements, until their taste be removed. "Water, not having taste, needs no insalivation and is readily accepted by the fauces."

Care of the Teeth In Summer.

Horace Fletcher is of the opinion that in the summer the dust laden atmosphere is particularly injurious to the teeth. He says: "Dental defects cause far more disease than the public imagine. "In the dust laden atmosphere of towns the teeth are very liable to disease," he says, "and even when healthy are necessarily dirtied. Some go so far as to advise all town dwellers daily to WASH OUT THE NASAL PASSAGES AND TO GARGLE THE THROAT; but, whatever may be thought of this, it is certain that under existing dietetic conditions special means are needed in order to keep the mouth and teeth clean. "When man fed on raw food this was not necessary, the food itself and the copious flow of saliva, induced by prolonged mastication, effectually cleansing these parts, but under present conditions food tends to remain within the mouth, especially between the teeth and in their crevices, and therefore special means are needed to remove it. "This is done by cleaning the teeth and by rinsing the mouth after each meal."

Eat Little Meat In Summer.

The amount of food devoured is IMMENSELY BEYOND any needs or demands of the physical system. The heat of the body must always be sustained at nearly 100 degrees. In summer we have only to combat a few degrees of lower temperature, but in winter by food and clothing we must raise the body heat from zero outside of us to 100 degrees above zero inside of us.

It plainly will not do to eat in summer as we do in winter, as much of the same kind of food, if we consider heat alone.

But in summer we live, as a rule, more active lives and pass off superfluous heat with great ease and rapidity, while the surface of the body is cooled by perspiration.

It is probable that most people digest and assimilate and dispose of waste SO MUCH BETTER IN THE WARM SEASON that they eat more than in winter and ought to do so. The kind of foods used should, however, be very unlike. It is almost impossible in summer to eat too much of ripe fruits, while of meats very few should eat large amounts in warm weather.

Meat should not be cooked in summer as much as in winter.
