> They Will Soon Be Here. The Price-Campbell cotion picker has demonstrated that cotton can be picked by machinery much faster and cheaper than it can be picked by hand. Among those who witnessed the demonstration of the Price-Campbell cotton picker near Charlotte last week was Mr. D. A. Tompkins, a man who has had much to do with cotton and cotton mill machinery, and who is therefore qualified to give an opinion on the question of machinery. He is hopeful of the Price-Campbell machine, which he says leaves only about two and a half per cent of the cotton in the field. near as can be done by hand, but a little of the cotton drops from the picker, making the two and a half per cent referred to above. Nine of these machines are now at work in Texas, and, as Mr. Tompkin says, it looks as if the present machine is going to stay on the market. Like all other inventions these machines will be rapidly improved, and in the next few years tney will be in use all over the cotton belt. Then we will hear no more complaints about the shortness of cotton pickers to gather the crop.
