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TAMMANY SWEEPS NEW YORK CITY.

THE DEMOCRATS CARRY MARYLAND BY BIG MAJORITY.

Hanna's Campaign Fund Invincible In Ohio. The Results of the Elections on Tuesday.

New York, Nov. 4.—George McClellan, Democrat, will be the next mayor of Greater New York, having defeated Mayor Seth Low for re-election by a plurality of 63,617, complete unofficial returns having been received from every election district in the city. By the same returns Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Charles V. Fornes, president of the board of aldermen, running for re-election on the Democratic ticket, though elected two years ago as Fusionists, defeated their Fusion opponents by 66,790 and 64,973 plurality, respectively, Comptroller Grout leading the city ticket.

McClellan's total vote for mayor was 314,906 to 251,289 for Low.

William S. Devery, independent candidate for mayor, polled only 2,935 votes in the entire city.

MARYLAND, MY MARYLAND!

Baltimore, Md., November 4.—At midnight the returns on Tuesday's election from Baltimore city and the State of Maryland had not all been received. In Baltimore city the entire Democratic State ticket, comprising Edwin Warfield, of Howard County, Governor; Gordon T. Atkinson, of Somerset County, Comptroller, and William Shepard Bryan, Jr., of Baltimore city, Attorney General, was elected by about 5,000 plurality. The Democrats elected in Baltimore city three Senators and eighteen members of the House of Delegates by large majorities. The Republicans elected one State Senator, and six members of the House of Delegates. Wm. H. Green, Republican, is apparently elected sheriff of the city by a plurality of between 100 and 200.

The returns from all of the counties of the State have not been received, but enough reports are in hand to assure an overwhelming Democratic majority on joint ballot in the General Assembly, which will elect a successor to United States Senator Louis McComas.

From returns received at this hour, it is conceded that the Democrats will have on joint ballot 82 votes, in the General Assembly to 41 Republican votes. Warfield's plurality in the State will probably reach 8,000.

OHIO STANDS BY HANNA.

Columbus, Ohio, November 4.—The Republican plurality in Ohio is about 115,000 for Governor, and the majority in the Legislature on joint ballot for Senator is 93.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Mass., November 4.—J. L. Bates, Republican candidate for Governor, was re-elected by about 35,000.

REPUBLICAN COLORADO.

Denver, Col., November 4.—The Republicans carried the State by 7,000.

SMALL VOTE IN MISSISSIPPI.

Jackson, Miss., November 4.—

The vote cast in yesterday's State election will not exceed 30,000.

IOWA STILL REPUBLICAN.

Des Moines, Iowa, November 4.—Official estimates place Governor Cummin's plurality over J. B. Sullivan, Democrat, at 55,000. The Democrats will have twenty-three of the 100 members of the next House, a gain of six, and eight of the fifty members of the Senate, a loss of two.

IN W. J. BRYAN'S STATE.

Omaha, Neb., November 4.—Returns received up to this evening show that Barnes (Republican) for Supreme Judge, will have a majority of at least 8,000 over Judge Sullivan.

PENNSYLVANIA'S MAJORITY.

Philadelphia, November 5.—Complete returns from all but eleven counties of the State indicate a plurality for William L. Mathues, Republican candidate for State Treasurer, approximating 265,000.

THE VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE.

Richmond, Va., November 4.—The latest returns from yesterday's elections in Virginia show that the complexion of the General Assembly will be little if at all changed from what it is now. There will be about nineteen Republican votes on joint ballot, two Fusionist votes and one Independent vote. The total membership of the Assembly is 142.

LITTLE RHODDY ALMOST LOST.

Providence, R. I., November 4.—Complete returns from the 152 districts of the State received today re-elect Governor L. F. C. Garvin by 1,587 plurality, a decrease of 6,151 votes.

DEMOCRATIC KENTUCKY.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 3.—Returns received from the State indicate the re-election of Governor J. C. W. Beckham, Democrat, by a majority conservatively estimated at 14,000. The vote cast was unusually heavy, and the returns are very slow. Out of 119 counties in the State returns have been received from only 22. These give Beckham 34,448; Belknap 22,035. Belknap carried five of these twenty-two counties, sixteen of which are nominally Democratic.

LYNCHING IN ARKANSAS.

Sequel of a Race Fight in Lake Village, in Which One White Man was Killed and Several Wounded.

Lake Village, Ark., November 3.—Henry Johnson, a negro, was taken from jail here at noon today by a mob and hanged in the centre of town. The act followed a fight between the whites and blacks early in the day, in which Frank Anderson was killed and B. Vinson, a lawyer from Little Rock, and several others were wounded. During the row, it is claimed, Ed Coleman, a negro, began shooting, which started a fusillade. When it was over the dead and wounded were counted. Coleman fled with a posse in pursuit. Johnson was locked up. Excitement ran high and a mass meeting was held, at which observation of law was urged but a large number of the more excitable rushed to the jail, battered down the doors, took Johnson and hanged him.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

Items of More or Less Interest Condensed Outside the State.

A purely accidental fire in the Vatican at Rome recently caused a damage of about \$50,000. The Pope has ordered an increase in the force of firemen in order to be able to face any situation of the kind in the future.

The recent destructive fire on Coney Island, which resulted in the loss of one life, the injury of two score persons five hundred persons made homeless, and a financial loss of \$1,500,000, is believed to have been the result of the malicious mischief of two drunken rowdies, former waiters in a hotel, who said that things were getting dull in the island and they believed they would liven things up with a fire. They are both in jail charged with arson.

At 5 a. m. on Monday two heavily armed men assaulted the assistant cashier of the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Co., at Nashville, Tenn., and robbed him of \$3,000 in money. The cashier went to the office at an early hour to get his pay roll in shape and was in the act of getting the currency out of the office safe when the assault was made.

Members of the Kings Mountain police force shot and fatally wounded a bank robber near Wright's Ferry, S. C. The man had robbed the Forest City, N. C., bank of \$2,000. He was met in the road and ordered to throw up his hands. Instead he fired, but missed, and was fired upon and fatally wounded.

A colored savings bank with a woman for president has begun business in Richmond, Va.

The wedding of Miss Goelet and the Duke of Roxburgh will be celebrated in St. Thomas church, New York, next Tuesday. The bride's mother will give her away. The wedding will be made as simple as possible and the number of guests at the church will be only about 200 and at the home only about 40.

The Cuban congress convened on Monday and a very conservative message from President Palma was received on the opening day.

Paul Kruger, the aged president of the Transvaal Republic, replying in Mentone, France, the other day, to the gift of a statue said that he is calmly resigned to the events in South Africa but that he did not despair. The aged man is described as being constantly occupied in reading the Bible, as desiring isolation and as maintaining a dignified bearing.

Postmaster General Payne has admitted that an investigation is being made of charges involving the office of the Third Assistant Postmaster General.

In a recent speech Secretary of the Navy Moody emphatically denied the statement which has been circulated that the marksmen of the American navy are deserters from the British navy, saying the remarkable scores in recent tests had been made by native Americans.

Joseph Craddock, a negro, was lynched by negroes near Shreveport, La., on Sunday night for killing two other negroes and fatally injuring another whose injuries re-

sulted in death. Craddock said he killed the inoffensive negroes just for fun. He was captured by a posse of white men, but a crowd of about three hundred, mostly negroes, took possession of him and hanged him to a tree and burned his body beneath it.

Six men were killed and ten slightly injured at Iona Island, N. Y., Wednesday afternoon, by an explosion at the United States arsenal, one of the largest magazines in the United States.

A middle-aged man in Philadelphia, about to be married the third time, committed suicide on Wednesday without any known cause. He went to the bath room and blew out his brains with a revolver.

Two young women were killed and fifty-one were injured, seventeen seriously, in the collision of two cable cars in a fog in Kansas City, Mo., early Wednesday morning.

SOUTH CAROLINA NEWS.

Items of More or Less Interest Condensed In the State.

Several of the pickpockets who did business in Columbia during Fair week have been given hearings and sent up to the higher court.

A fire in Ninety-Six early Monday morning, origin unknown, destroyed the store and stock of goods of J. C. Wise and damaged other property, the total loss being about \$4,000.

The naval estimates for the coming fiscal year provide for continuing the work on the dry dock at Charleston and the Charleston navy yard comes in for some of the largest estimates made by the department.

A burglar entered the residence of Mrs. M. I. Fishburne, in Columbia, about 9 o'clock Sunday night, and took an old silver watch case from a trunk and a small savings bank containing 50 cents. He left a purse hanging in an apron pocket containing \$15.

During a negro hot supper in Anderson county Tuesday night, one negro shot another negro through the cheek. The ball went on and struck another negro, Henry Aiken, in the mouth. Aiken caught the ball between his teeth and spat it out. That is the story as it comes from Anderson.

A HORRIBLE DEATH.

Aged Confederate Veteran Caught in Shafting and Killed.

Laurens, Nov. 3.—Martin Riddle, a well to do farmer and a highly respected citizen of the Warrior Creek section of this county, met a tragic death this morning about 10 o'clock. He operated in connection with farming interests a big ginny. This morning in passing among the shafting he was suddenly jerked into the machinery and terribly mangled and bruised. Death ensued in 15 minutes. He was 60 years old, being a veteran of the War Between the States, and his friends recall his record as a soldier worthy of the name. W. L. T.

PANAMA PROCLAIMS INDEPENDENCE.

SHE CEDED FROM COLOMBIA AT 6 P. M.
ON TUESDAY.

The Cause Supposed to be Desire of
Isthmus to Have Panama Canal
Completed.

Panama, Colombia, November 3.—The independence of the isthmus was proclaimed at 6 p. m. today. A large and enthusiastic crowd of all political parties assembled and marched to the headquarters of the Government troops, where Gen. Tovar and Amaya, who arrived this morning, were imprisoned in the name of the Republic of Panama. The enthusiasm was immense, and at least three thousand of the men in the gathering were armed.

SOUNDS LIKE WAR.

Washington, November 4.—Vice United States Consul Ehrman, at Panama, cables the State department under today's date that the Colombian Government war ship Bogota is shelling the city. One Chinaman has been killed. Mr. Ehrman has been instructed to protest against the bombardment.

RECOGNITION REQUESTED.

The United States Government received a cablegram today from Panama requesting that it recognize the new Government. The officials here are as yet in ignorance as to what the new Government consists of and have taken no action on the request.

A FOOLISH MOTHER'S CRIME.

She Points a Rifle at her Baby in Fun
and it is Discharged With Fatal
Effect.

"Lookout, I'll shoot baby," cried Mrs. Thomas Zant, of Valdosta, Ga., in a frolic with her year-old child on Saturday, at the same time pointing at the baby on old parlor rifle, that had been laid around the house since Christmas. The child laughed in glee, but in an instant there was an explosion and a scream of pain from the baby and another scream of horror from the mother. The child lingered in agony until this morning, when it died. Mrs. Zant is frantic with grief and denounces herself as a murderess, though it is conceded that the shooting was accidental.
