"Whereas, the proper authorities exert themselves so feebly to apprehend and bring to trial perpetrators of such foul deeds, and the courts so signally fail to mete part of last week with her son, out justice upon the guilty parties, Thes. L. B Epps, at Newberry. thereby encouraging such atrocities, rather than affording the proper protection to the law-abiding citizens of the county and upholding the dignity of the law, and

"Whereas, we believe that the failure upon the part of the proper is traceable to the damaging influences of whiskey upon the morals of our people, together with the unscrupulous methods sometimes employed by the legal fraternity in their efforts to confuse witnesses testimony, and thereby defeat the ends of justice and otherwise manipulate the courts so as to make them serve selfish ends, rather than the good of commonwealth; therefore, be it
