

FOR LAW AND ORDER.

Resolutions Adopted by Mass Meeting of Citizens of Saluda County—Remedies Demanded.

Saluda, S. C., Nov. 3.—Pursuant to call, a mass meeting was held in the court house yesterday, and the following preamble and resolutions were passed:

"Whereas, Saluda county is so rapidly losing prestige among the counties of the State and is becoming a hiss and by-word in other States, and, justly so, because of the alarming increase of lawlessness, and especially the heinous crime of murder, and

"Whereas, the proper authorities exert themselves so feebly to apprehend and bring to trial perpetrators of such foul deeds, and the courts so signally fail to mete out justice upon the guilty parties, thereby encouraging such atrocities, rather than affording the proper protection to the law-abiding citizens of the county and upholding the dignity of the law, and

"Whereas, we believe that the failure upon the part of the proper authorities and the courts at large is traceable to the damaging influences of whiskey upon the morals of our people, together with the unscrupulous methods sometimes employed by the legal fraternity in their efforts to confuse witnesses and to break down and destroy testimony, and thereby defeat the ends of justice and otherwise manipulate the courts so as to make them serve selfish ends, rather than the good of commonwealth; therefore, be it

"Resolved, first, That we, the citizens of Saluda county, now in mass meeting assembled, do deplore the sad facts as stated in the above preamble, and

"Second, That we do hereby appeal to the proper authorities (if any there be) to rid our county of the curse imposed upon our selves in the Saluda dispensary, and that we will ever hold ourselves in readiness to suppress the whiskey evil, whether it results from the dispensary or from private individuals or from corporation of individuals, and

"Third, That we hereby pledge ourselves to assist in every legitimate way in the prosecution of all criminals, both white and colored alike, and

"Fourth, We further pledge ourselves that when called upon to act as jurors we will discharge our duty faithfully and unflinchingly, regardless of whom it may affect, and

"Fifth, That we hereby place our condemnation upon the practice of the legal fraternity in general, and on the members of the Saluda bar in particular, in so far as such practice and manipulations referred to in the above preamble may apply to any particular member, or members, and upon the judiciary of South Carolina for their tolerance of such, and

"Sixth, That a copy of this preamble and resolutions be given to the press for publication, and

"Seventh, That we do hereby petition the next general assembly to so change the jury law that the findings of ten out of twelve jurors shall be sufficient to convict, instead of the present law making it necessary for the entire jury to agree in order to a conviction, and

"Eighth, That we do hereby petition the governor of the State to offer a suitable reward for the apprehension and conviction of the party or parties perpetrating the foul murder committed near Batesburg, in this county, and for which there has not as yet been any arrest made."

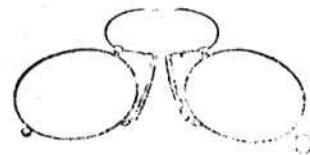
