

DEMOCRATS FEAR HANNA.

It is Their Opinion That Roosevelt Will Be Much Easier To Beat Than Senator Hanna.

A dispatch from Washington, discussing the next presidential campaign in connection with the recent elections, says that the only fear the Democrats have is that the Republicans may fail to nominate Mr Roosevelt.

Democrats, as a rule, expressed their entire satisfaction at the success of Senator Hanna in overthrowing Johnsonism in Ohio, but they do not relish the idea of his becoming the Presidential candidate of the Republican party instead of Mr Roosevelt.

Republican Congressmen are not as enthusiastic over Mr. Roosevelt today as they were during the last Congress. Most of them in a perfunctory manner declare that he has practically nominated himself, and it might be embarrassing to the party to turn him down now.

THE DEMOCRATIC OUTLOOK.

A Georgia Representative Discusses President's Timber and The Recent Elections.

A Washington special to the News and Courier says that Representative Lon Livingston, one of the most prominent members of the Georgia delegation in Congress, is outspoken in his advocacy of Senator Gorman, of Maryland, and Gen. J. S. Black, of Illinois, as the Democratic Presidential ticket in 1904.

"I have been associated with Senator Gorman in Congress for many years and I believe he is capable of leading the Democrats to victory next year. He is a natural and unostentatious leader, and he will command more strength in the doubtful States than any man we can suggest. His recent victory in Maryland, which followed his able and effective campaigning, has won him many new supporters all over the country. He was previously strong in the Southern States, but since his well-expressed and timely criticism of Mr Roosevelt's objectionable race policy he is regarded as standing head and shoulders above any other Democrat who has been mentioned in connection with the Presidency. I believe Senator Gorman is the favorite of a large majority of the Democratic party and I also believe that he should have as his running mate the strongest Western Democrat in sight, Gen Black has once been elected Governor of Illinois. He is now commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, and he has an unimpeachable record as a soldier and a statesman. Gorman and Black, in my judgment, would be a strong ticket."

Mr. Livingston went on to say that the result in New York will stimulate the Democratic party in every other State to get together and submit to party organization and discipline. It also shows that New York city, under normal conditions, is a democratic city. It might be of advantage to have a New York man at the head of the ticket, providing he is well known and has the confidence of the people and can give assurance that the business interests of the country

will not be seriously interfered with.

"In other words," continued Mr. Livingston, "we want a man who is and has always been a Democrat. He should have experience in national affairs, and be able to guide his party with courage and at the same time show his opponents that he can be trusted to administer the affairs of the nation fearlessly along liberal and patriotic lines."

Mr. Livingston added that "one of the greatest blessings to the Democratic party last Wednesday was the political burial of Tom Johnson and his undemocraticisms in Ohio. While it generally makes me hot to see a Democratic ticket beaten, in this instance I believe the Democratic party is better off in the estimation of conservative and practical people throughout the country because of Tom Johnson's defeat. We could not afford to stand for all the wild ideas of Tom Johnson, and his defeat shows the country that the Democratic party is not made up of men of the Tom Johnson stripe."

There is a general feeling among Democratic Congressmen that the party will be thoroughly organized during this session of Congress, and party discipline will receive more attention in the deliberations of the minority than ever before.
