THE STYLUS.

The Newberry College Stylus this year is printed by the Columbia State. The reason, as stated in the editorial, is that "this large printing establishment is fully prepared to do this class of work and to do it well."

The Stylus, since it was first established, has been printed in one or the other of the printshops in Newberry, and while the State has done a very good job of plain printing, it is very little better than could have been secured in either one of the printing offices in Newberry.

The editor of this paper, who was the printer of the Stylus for several years, and who, with three brothers, is an alumnus of the college, and who for twenty years and more has worked in season and out of season for the college as opportunity presented, and who has already graduated one son there and has had two more in the college and has one there now, desires to say when an appeal is made to the friends of the college for aid that there is such a thing as reciprocal relations.

We have at present no department from which such information may be obtained, and our great agricultural advantages count for aimes, nothing in attracting immigrants. The great majority of the other States of the Union have long since recognized the need of such an agency or department and have made provision accordingly.

Honor to whom honor is due.

But the purpose is to make the Stylus "better than it has ever been—better in mechanical construction and better in reading matter." We hope the purpose may be accomplished.

The immigration convention held in Columbia on Tuesday we hope will result in much good to the State. The purpose is a good one. We have long been of the opinion that there should be established in this State a department of immigration or agriculture and that it would pay much better and be more profitable than spending money on exhibits by the State at expositions.

It is a source of great regret to us that we could not get off to the Confederate reunion in Augusta this week. Especially so after we had insisted on some of our old Confederate friends to go with us. Imperative business engagements at home debarred us the pleasure. We

are glad, however, that our friends D. A. Ruff, J. Cal Neel, O. H. Buzhardt, and E. P. Matthews, were able to go, and we are sure they enjoyed the occasion. It was our misfortune.

The Newberry cotton market has been as good as any town in the State this year. Frequently when Liverpool and New York were down eight to ten points, the Newberry market went up as many points. There have been sold here this season some twelve to fifteen thousand bales, about two-thirds of the amount to be received here. We usually get from 18c30 to 20c bales.

DEPARTMENT OF IMMIGRATION.

In connection with the Matueson and other immigration plans which are now being proposed and the immigration convention held in Columbia only this week, it may be interesting to note that Governor McSweeney urged action along these same lines during his term of office.

Governor McSweeney, in his annual message presented to the general assembly in January of this year, said:

"It is a noticeable fact, and one at this time worthy of serious consideration, that the State has no immigration agency, or bureau of information. Information in regard to our farming lands is constantly being sought by that class of thrifty farmers in Canada, the cold Northwest and New England, who are looking southward for future homes. We have at present no department from which such information may be obtained, and our great agricultural advantages count for aimes, nothing in attracting immigrants. The great majority of the other States of the Union have long since recognized the need of such an agency or department and have made provision accordingly. I earnestly recommend that you take some action in regard to this matter. If it is not desired that a separate department be created, its duties for the present may be devolved upon the Secretary of State and the State geologist."
