

SENATOR TILLMAN'S VIEWS.

SAYS the Race Question is an Issue and a Good One, and He is Hopeful of the Result in 1904.

United States Senator Ben Tillman, of South Carolina, while in Atlanta this week gave his opinion as to the possibilities of the Democratic party in the coming Presidential election. Senator Tillman said:

"The Democrats have a good chance of putting in their candidate. The elections in New York, Maryland and Rhode Island are victories for the Democrats that will be a great help in the coming election.

"The election of McClellan in New York will have a national effect. You see the election of Democrats here and there will spread the possibilities over the entire country.

"Some people have argued that the comparatively small majority in Maryland is not a victory that will be very effective nationally. I would like to call their attention to the fact that heretofore we have had no majority at all, and the election of a Democrat is a great victory.

"Roosevelt's attitude towards the negro is going to hurt the chances of the Republicans. The race problem as an issue will be a good one. The people over the country are taking an interest in the elections. The trouble that the negro caused in the North the other day during election will harm the Republicans.

"The people all over the United States are changing their ideas regarding the black man."

THE BIG WHALEY MILLS.

W. B. Smith Whaley Resigns the Presidency—New Board of Directors Chosen.

The management of the "Whaley mills" passed into the hands of a new board of directors Friday night, the directorate of the Richland, the Grandby and the Olympia being identical. The majority of the former board having resigned, the following gentlemen were chosen to compose the new board:

Mr. Whaley having resigned the presidency, Mr. Lewis W. Parker of Greenville was elected unanimously to be president temporarily.

It is understood that Mr. Whaley's resignation does not mean any change in the management of the Whaley mills.

COMPLETE REORGANIZATION.

The stockholders of the Whaley mills—the Olympia, Granby and Richland—met in Columbia Saturday and effected a complete reorganization. Mr. Lewis W. Parker, being at present president of the Victor, Monaghan and Apache mills, declined the permanent presidency, but agreed to act temporarily.

The board of directors named above were chosen for the three mills.

It was decided to issue twenty year six per cent. bonds, as follows: Olympia mills, \$1,750,000; Granby mills, \$800,000; Richland mills, \$450,000, making a total issue by the mills of \$3,000,000.

ALLEGED NEGRO DISFRANCHISEMENT.

Resolution Aimed at the South's Election Laws Introduced in Congress.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Widespread comment was aroused at the capitol today by the action of Representative Dick of Ohio in introducing a resolution providing for a congressional inquiry into the alleged disfranchisement of voters in the South and for the reduction of congressional representations of those States wherein such conditions are found to exist.

Representative Dick is an intimate friend of Senator Hanna, a strong man in the house, and one of the big men in the Republican party. For this reason there is rightly attached a far-reaching significance to his resolution that others of the same character introduced by less prominent Republicans entirely lacked.

THE RESOLUTION.

The resolution reads:

"Whereas, it is a matter of common information and belief that the right of some male citizens being 21 years of age to vote at elections named in said amendment to the constitution named aforesaid, except for participation in the rebellion or other crime, is denied and abridged in certain States, therefore,

"Resolved, That the matter be referred to the committee on election of the president, vice-president and representatives in congress, whose duty it shall be and who shall have full and ample power to investigate and inquire into the validity of the election laws of the several States and the manner of their enforcement, and whether the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress or the members of the legislature of any State is denied to the male inhabitants of any of the States being 21 years of age and a citizen of the United States, except for participation in rebellion or other crime."

NOMINATION OF DR. CRUM.

The Opposition is Still Vigorous to Him But this is Presidential Year.

The nomination of Dr. Crum, colored, to be collector of customs at Charleston, S. C., has again been referred to the Senate committee on commerce, and the prolonged fight of the last session of Congress against his confirmation will be renewed. There are vacancies in the committee to be filled, but opponents of Crum's confirmation are aware that there will be a majority at this session to report the nomination favorably to the Senate.

Senator Tillman has just arrived in town and said yesterday that he had no programme outlined. The fight will by no means be abandoned. Crum has been serving on a recess appointment since the Senate adjourned. On principle there is probably a large majority of the Senate opposed to Crum's confirmation, but for political reasons few Republicans dare, just before a Presidential campaign, to vote against him.
