### A LESSON CAME OUT OF TEXAS.

Did you ever stop to think how humanity is knit and woven together; how the baker is dependent on the tailor, and the tailor on the brick-layer, and so on through all the list of human endeavor? Some folks think that a man can live by himself. He can't. The absolutely selfish life is impossible. There is a good object lesson in Thurber, Texas, which is a mining town.

The miners struck. It was a row over wages, and the public took little interest in the matter. Some of the people said: "These unions are getting too fresh. They should be taught a lesson. They can't run this town." And some more said: "Let 'em fight it out. It is none of our funeral."

And all were wrong. The strike continued. Men must work to eat. Most of the miners moved to other towns. Because there was no demand for houses rents dropped and owners of property suffered. The stores had less patronage, the churches were half filled, the theatre could do little business. Why, there wasn't a corner of Thurber that didn't feel the strike more or less keenly. It was necessary for a town of 5,000 to shrink to the proportions of a country village, if the mines were to stay closed.

The people woke. They became interested. They used their influence for peace. They were ready to do anything to start the wheel moving again.

And the strike was settled. Wages were raised, and the business men were so glad to see the miners and their families returning that man were supplied with transportation free.

Thurber, Texas, is doing business again at the old stand and her citizens realize that selfishness and prosperity, indifference and business activity can't exist in the same town. Everybody is dependent on somebody else.

And that is true in Thurber and every other city or hamlet in this broad land.—Spartanburg Journal.

This is a very good lesson and is quoted here to emphasize just what The Herald and News has been preaching for many years. We cannot live to ourselves even in business, and what every community needs is a broad public spirit which takes time and occasion to do something for the general welfare—something that will benefit the whole in material and moral up lifting and when you do you have benefited yourself whether you feel it directly or not. Let us take this lesson from the experience of this Texas town. Suppose one or both of the mills in this town should shut down, it would not only affect the people who work in the mills, but every business interest in the community would feel it. On the other hand if some other enterprise were started here which would give employment to labor every business interest would reap its part of the beneficial results. It behooves the business men of any community to get together for the up-lifting of that community. There is no good business sense or judgment in every man having his hand on his brother's throat in the same community.

The change in the schedule which the Southern has announced is the best schedule we have ever had on the Southern. We will get the Charleston and Columbia papers about an hour later each morning but it will give our friends as far up as Greenwood and as far down as Columbia an opportunity twice a day to come to Newberry to do their trading and get back home in a few hours.

The Herald and News believes that it would be a good thing for the Legislature to repeal that provision of the statute which relates to the holding of special courts. If it is really necessary to have these extra courts it would be far better to have some additional circuits.

### HARD TO BELIEVE.

The Newberry Herald and News says that one hundred subscribers to that excellent paper are in arrears for subscription. The editor of The Herald and News is a man under the tongue of good report, and he stands sponsor for the State Press Association. For these reasons we accept the statement of our friend that there are one hundred delinquents on his list, but, ordinarily, an editor would be required to bring affidavit to get credit for such statements—Press and Banner.

The Press and Banner is right. The statement as printed is hard to believe and should not be believed. The Press and Banner is a close reader of The Herald and News evidently and we thank our cotemporary for this opportunity which it gives us to correct an error which otherwise we very probably would not have observed. The number of subscribers in arrears we left blank in the copy to be inserted in the proof after running over the mailing list to get the correct number, and we wrote 1000, but the printer in correcting the proof made it 100. It would indeed be remarkable if we had only 100 subscribers in arrears and if only that many were in arrears there would have been no occasion for the appeal.

Our friends have already been responding, but this is the week we are expecting to hear from them. We hope to have the number of arrears greatly reduced by the first of December.

As The Herald and News has heretofore remarked, Newberry has been one of the best cotton markets in the State this season. On Saturday we had wagons in Newberry with cotton from within three miles of Laurens, and near Clinton and Cross Hill. Men sold cotton here who did not even know where the banks were, because they had never been here before with cotton. The merchants will reap the benefit of this together with the farmer, for every man who sells cotton will spend some money in the same town in which he sells.
