

## GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

## Items of More or Less Interest Condensed Outside the State.

Several members of the Louisville, Ky., fire department have been indicated for looting during a fire.

Because the beauty of her face had been marred by ill health Mrs. Lulu W. Brennan, the wife of a wealthy man of Denver, killed herself by the use of chloroform in a hotel in Chicago.

President Roosevelt has refused the request of the governor of Colorado for United States troops to preserve order in mining districts because it appears that the resources of the State to keep the peace have been exhausted.

Deputy Sheriff H. O. Richard, of Lawley, Fla., was shot and killed on Thursday afternoon as he was driving by the home of the Bennett brothers, whom he had previously attempted to bring to justice for several alleged crimes. All the parties involved are prominent.

Thirty-one men were killed and at least fifteen were injured in a head-end collision between a freight train and a work train on the Big Four railroad, between Mackinaw and Tremont, in Illinois, on Thursday afternoon. The conductor of the freight train had received orders to meet the work train at Mackinaw, but instead of doing this he failed to stop.

Tom Horn, scout, Indian fighter and cattle detective, and who was chief of scouts under General Miles in his Puerto Rico campaign, went smiling to the gallows at Cheyenne, Wyo., on Friday, to expiate the crime of murdering Willie Nickell, 14 years old, whom Horn shot and killed in July, 1901, on Iron mountain.

A man convicted of murder was shot to death in Salt Lake City on Friday. The choice of death by hanging or shooting is given the condemned in Utah and the man chose the latter.

Seventeen former city officials of Grand Rapids, Mich., are under indictment for accepting a bribe in connection with the famous scheme for supplying the city with water from Lake Michigan.

The annual foot-ball game at Washington, Pa., between Washington and Jefferson and West Virginia university ended in a fight in which students, townspeople and police freely engaged. Heads were broken, bricks and clubs hurled through the air in every direction, and a number of arrests were made.

The Chicago street car strike has settled down for the time being, at least. There was a riot on Saturday, however, caused by several thousand men, women and children attacking wagons carrying food to non-union men at the car sheds. The mob was finally driven off by the police.

The superintendent and a miner were killed while descending the shaft of a mine at Cripple Creek, Col. Officers of the mine assert that the explosion which did the work was caused by an infernal machine and 400 militiamen have been placed on guard around the company's properties.

The investigation, before the senate committee on military affairs, into certain transactions during General Wood's administration of the government of Cuba, is still going on. One charge is that General Wood was bribed by a gambling concern to use his influence to get for it a concession for carrying on its business. Some incriminating evidence has been produced.
