Items of More or Less Interest Condensed In the State.

J. G. Moody, a white haired man 61 years of age, has been convicted in Marlboro county of violation of the dispensary law.

The city of Aiken is still very much excited over the recent robberies. Everything goes to show that the robbers were bold and experienced and that they were white men in almost a vestigial form.

Mr. John Bell Towill of Batesburg Editor of the Batesburg Advertiser, has announced himself a candidate for membership of the state board of dispensary directors.

Haye Hayes, convicted as General of the murder of his young wife, has been sentenced to be hanged on January 15th. An appeal has been taken.

The Northerners have begun to arrive in Aiken for their winter sojourn in this famous South Carolina resort. W. C. Whitney has already sent down his racing stable.

Mr. Frank Goss, a prominent citizen of Darlington county, was struck by a train in Summerville on Friday night and killed. He was visiting in Summerville and had been to an entertainment and stayed at the home of his nephew.

The 17 year old son of Mr. Frank C. Moody of Georgetown county, met his death from typhoid fever Sunday the 19th of a day ago, while playing. The cause being a change in the temperature of the water.

Governor Howard accompanied by Messrs. J. G. and others called on President Roosevelt last week to urge him to use his influence to see that the Government of our army pay the churches. The delegation had an interview with Secretary Bacon on the same subject. They received encouraging assurance in both instances.

Sumner University on Friday received the largest gift ever made by one individual during the half century of its existence under the present name in Greenville. Dr. Chas. H. Johnson devoted \$50,000 to the endowment fund upon condition that the present management be successful whereby \$30,000 is to be secured for this fund by December 1, 1910, and that \$20,000 in addition be obtained upon like conditions so that the sum total shall be \$50,000. Dr. Johnson is 64 years of age and has filled the chair of mathematics in Furman for 25 years.

LATIMER ON GOOD ROADS.

Hopes the Bill Providing for Federal Aid Will be Passed by Congress This Session.

The Anderson correspondent of the State says that Senator A. C. Latimer, while in Anderson last week, spoke very hopefully of the prospects for the passage of his bill providing for federal aid in building good roads. During his stay in Washington he talked with a number of senators and representatives and found the sentiment in favor of it much stronger than he had anticipated. A number of the leaders, on both the Democratic and Republican sides, have declared in favor of the idea, and the details of the bill that will be introduced are now being worked out. Senator Latimer says he is encouraged to hope that the bill will pass this winter, but if it is not passed at this session the sentiment in favor of it will be developed so strongly that its passage will follow very soon.
