SPECIAL JUDGE FERGUSON.

Newberry Bar Puts On Record Its Appreciation of His Services—Mr. Ferguson Responds With Feeling.

At the conclusion of the business of the equity court on Friday afternoon, the following resolutions of appreciation of the services of Special Judge John W. Ferguson, of Laurens, were read by Col. O. L. Schumpert, chairman of the Newberry Bar association:

"The Newberry Bar association, appreciating the services rendered by the members of the bar and litigants having business in the courts by the Honorable John W. Ferguson, who has so acceptably presided over the fall term of the court of common pleas, desire to express their appreciation of him; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the thanks of the Newberry bar are due and are hereby tendered to the Honorable John W. Ferguson for his services so rendered as aforesaid, and for his uniform courtesy and patience towards the members of the bar. And they further desire to testify to his ability and fairness as a judge.

"2. That the chairman of the bar be directed to bring these resolutions to the attention of the court and request that they be spread upon the minutes of the court."

Col. Schumpert in introducing the resolutions made a few appropriate remarks, and the resolutions were seconded by Messrs. J. Y. Culbreath, George S. Mower, George Johnstone, Walter H. Hunt, Cole L. Blease, Fred. H. Dominick, Robert H. Welch, and J. B. Hunter, all of whom expressed the highest satisfaction with the services of Special Judge Ferguson and their pleasure at having him to preside over their court.

Judge Ferguson's remarks showed that he was deeply touched by this evidence of appreciation and personal esteem. With much feeling he thanked the members of the bar for the resolutions, saying that this action was a matter of especial pride to him on account of the fact that it was in Newberry county that he was born and reared, and here he first struggled for a livelihood and here he married. He felt that he had been highly honored in that he had been brought to Newberry, to preside over the court here, by the descendants of the great jurist, Justice John Belton O'Neill and by the descendants of his great rival on the equity side of the court, Chancellor Job Johnstone. And he deeply felt the confidence that had been placed in him when several members of this bar who had been engaged with him in the forum of debate had requested his appointment to hold an equity court where matters are decided by heart and conscience—when an appointment of this kind had been requested for him by these notwithstanding bitter controversies in the past. The action of the bar, he said, was something that he could never forget or appreciate.

The resolutions were spread upon the journal of the court.
