HERD OF GOATS.

Imported From South Africa is Valued at \$40,000.

One hundred and forty-nine of the highest priced goats that were ever brought to this country arrived from South Africa recently by the British steamship Susquehanna.

The goats were purchased in Cape Colony by Mr. G. A. Early, an American, who had visited South Africa before the outbreak of the Boer war.

Mr. Early is making the experiment of domesticating these valuable animals in this country, and has secured a place in New Jersey, where the goats will be taken after they have undergone the customary quarantine in the state quarantine station for animals at Lyndhurst, L. I.

This breed of goats was introduced into Cape Colony about 40 years ago. They thrive there and largely propagated, the climate being specially well suited to the perfect development of the wool.

The importer believes that the animals will thrive as well here as in South Africa, and, as the breed is prolific, the kids grow fast and arriving early at maturity, he is confident of the outcome of his experiment to domesticate them here.
