WHAT STRONGER ARGUMENT?

Mr. Tayloe said he had received stacks of letters about them and that it was the purpose of the management to satisfy the people if possible. We told him that we had seen one newspaper that had spoken favorably of the present schedules. "For gracious sake let me see it," he said. We hunted up 'The Newberry Herald and News, and the article was read. This one harmonious note was so pleasant to him that he asked us to give him the paper which we did—Greenwood Journal.

We are very glad that Mr. Tayloe knows a good newspaper when he sees it.

But the fun meant to be poked at The Herald and News aside, it makes us weary, very weary, to see the newspapers in all the little towns above Newberry kicking against a schedule because the daily papers do not reach their towns as early in the day as formerly. Have these editors who are supposed to be running papers of their own nothing to do except read the dailies? Are the editors of the little dailies, like the one in Anderson, for instance, so in love with their big city brothers, that they like to see the big dailies covering the local field better than they can do it themselves?

Schedules are not arranged to carry newspapers. It seems to us that the convenience of the traveling public and the commercial interests of a town should outweigh inconvenience experienced in receiving mail.

The schedule is the best we have ever had. Let it stand.

If the editor of the Journal can not live in peace without reading the Columbia and Charleston dailies early each day he might move to Columbia or Charleston and receive them at 3.30 a. m.

How It Happened.

The Herald and News has received the following communication from the parents of Mike Haigler, the negro who had both his legs cut off by a C., N. & L. freight on last Friday:

"The evidence of Michael Haigler is that he was going up the C., N. & L. track towards the crossing. The Southern engine was passing by him with a string of cars. He did not know the C., N. & L. was behind him and was quickly knocked down and run over by the C., N. & L. car. No one was seen on the rear end of the car, which was coming from the Mollohon mill. This is eye evidence and can be proved."

The story of the affair as printed in The Herald and News of Tuesday is corroborated in its entirety by the testimony of an eye-witness taken immediately after the accident.
