THE PASSING OF HAMBURG.

The Town that Was Once One of the Most Prosperous in the South.

The announcement that the town of Hamburg, S. C., is to be reclaimed by the State as waste land and sold for unpaid taxes is a new reminder of the vanity of human hopes and calculations and the shortness of human foresight. Far back in the thirties and forties Hamburg was one of the most thriving and promising towns in the South. It was on the South Carolina side of the Savannah river, immediately established, we believe, by a thrifty German named Schultz. Some thousands of people lived and were busy there, and the town had a bauk which was known throughout the South. Bills of the Bank of Hamburg were good everywhere when nearly everything else was under suspicion. On all of this thrift and hope and busy life a blight fell suddenly from conditions which nobody had dreamed of. Nobody in Hamburg had the slightest doubt of the permanency of the town. Land was bought and sold on the lots and at high prices, and regarded as the safest possible investment. A railroad came through and Hamburg decayed as rapidly as a bit of infected fruit.

The bank was closed, the merchants failed or moved away, leaving their stores vacant and for rent, people abandoned their homes, and in a few months nothing was left but empty buildings, which fell to pieces fast, their windows knocked out by the stone of the idle passers by, their doors broken open and left gaping. The town was absolutely desolate and abandoned. After the war some negroes made a settlement in the few remaining houses and re-established the town with a government of their own. They made this peculiarly offensive to the white people compelled to pass through on their way to and from Augusta, and in 1876 occurred the "Hamburg riot," which marked the beginning of the revolution that made Wade Hampton governor and overthrew the Republicans. That was the finishing stroke of Hamburg. Nobody cared to claim the land on which the town once stood, for what had been streets were mere stretches of weeds with gloomy ruins on both sides, also overgrown with weeds and grass. And now the State has taken possession and probably will sell it to somebody for a farm. A few sticks of dynamite will remove the last rotting remnants of the old warehouses and the ploughsl turn over the site of a once busy and prosperous community, destroyed by one of the greatest agents of civilization which carried prosperity to so many other places. Hamburg has depended on river traffic largely and it may be remarked incidentally that if Richnond had a similar dependence she ould be very much in the same ndition.
