A negro has been arrested in Florida, wanted in Lancaster county for killing a negro. The negro killed his man, went to Virginia, came back and gave himself up to the authorities and then escaped from jail.

The State newspaper reports that negro farmers near Hopkins, Weston and Congaree, in the southern section of Richland county, are destitute and on the verge of starvation on account of their crops being wiped out by a series of weather conditions starting with the big flood of last June, hail storms which occurred later and early frosts. CAPERS SHOWS AN ALIBI.

Says That He Was Not At Hanna's Banquet at Which the Negro Judson Lyons Sat.

The Washington correspondent of the State says that if John G. Capers, republican national committeeman, United States district attorney, Republican referee and chief adviser of the president for the State of South Carolina, did not sit down to table, eat, drink and was not merry with a negro—Judson Lyons, register of the treasury—at Senator Hanna's banquet to the national committeemen Saturday night, 12th, at the Arlington hotel, then Mr. Capers has been grossly slandered by four members of the national committee who were present—one of them a representative in congress—and by the esteemed secretary of Senator Hanna himself.

"If Mr. Capers did attend the banquet as Representative Brownlow, national committeeman from Tennessee; Solomon Luna, national committeeman from New Mexico, and Elmer Dover, secretary to Senator Hanna, positively assert that he did, then so much the worse for Mr. Capers' memory. For these gentlemen declare with one accord that Mr. Capers was at the banquet and remained throughout; that if he had any compunctions about eating with his conferee from Georgia he kept them strictly to himself.

"By members of the committee who were there it is stated that Mr. Capers appeared to be intensely interested in the remarks of National Committeeman Dimick from Alabama, who spoke on the negro question in the South and the attitude of the Southerners towards him.

"The many friends of Mr. Capers among the Southern colony in Washington are hoping that further developments will show that he has a double and that his double ate with the negro while Mr. Capers went to Baltimore."

CAPERS SHOWS AN ALIBI.

Capt. Capers in a card published in the State of Sunday says that he was not at the banquet, but at the time the banquet was given he had been called to Baltimore on business. He publishes a copy of a letter he wrote Mr. Dover, Hanna's secretary, expressing his regrets that he would not be present.

Mr. Capers places his "keen regrets" prominently in his letter.
