

IN MEMORY OF HAMPTON.

Committee Appointed To Raise Newberry's Share of Monument Fund Issues An Address.

At the last session of the legislature a bill was passed appropriating \$10,000 to be used with a similar amount to be contributed by the people of South Carolina, for the erection of a monument to the memory of General Wade Hampton.

The committee which was appointed to take the matter in charge made a report several days ago showing that only about half of the \$10,000 to be secured in voluntary subscriptions had been raised.

It is desired, however, to raise all of the amount, if possible, before the legislature convenes. Newberry's share is only \$100. Newberry is called upon to contribute only \$100 for the erection of a monument to perpetuate the memory of the man whom she followed blindly but wisely in the darkest period of the State's history and who led her and the whole State into the light of a better day!
