FOUND DEAD IN BED.

Lewis Hampton, The Man Who Superintended The Work of Cememting the Sidewalks.

Mr. Lewis Hampton, who in the employ of Frank Barker, of Savannah, superintendent the work of cementing the sidewalks in Newberry, which work was completen only a few days ago, was found dead in bed at his room at the Central hotel yesterday morning. The coroner empanelled a jury of inquest which, after an examination by Drs W. G. Houseal and J. M. Kibler, who pronounced it a case of organic heart failure, reached a verdict of death from natural causes.

Mr. Hampton's death was discovered by Jake Shears, a little negro who went to his room about wait on him, as had been his custom. After making the discovery Shears day for Gaffney to take charge of first went across the street and talked to his father and was questioned by Mr. C. E. Boyd, who was working in Speers' marble yard. He then went back to the house and told Mrs. Eidson, the proprietor of the hotel. When several gentlemen weut to the dead man's room they found his pockets slightly turned as if some one had gone through them and they contained not a cent of money, although Mr. Hampton was known to have had money on the Saturday night before The little negro having excited suspicion by going across the streets and talking to his father before notifying those in the house and having been the only one Mr. E.
