The subject of this memoir, James Caleb Cook, was born in Newberry county Sept. 20, 1823. In his young

manhood he gave himself to the Lord by confirmation, and lived a consistent Christian throughout his long life; an example to all.

When the tocsin of war sounded and South Carolina called her sons to take up arms in her defense he promptly responded. He was a member of Co. H., Third Regiment, S. C. V. (Capt. D. A. Dickert's company.) He went through this terrible struggle unhurt and returned to his native county to rebuild his home. He was married in 1865 to Miss Elizabeth Sheeley, who together with seven children, survives him.

When Mt. Pilgrim church was organized he was a charter member and was elected elder, which office he held until his death.

Our departed brother was for 12 or more years superintendent of Mt. Pilgrim Sunday School, giving his best efforts to the training of the youth, for in them he recognized the future workers of the church and the state.

We, the committee of Mt. Pilgrim Evangelical Lutheran church, would place on record the high esteem in which he was held by his brethren in the work of the church, and his zeal in the cause of the Master.
