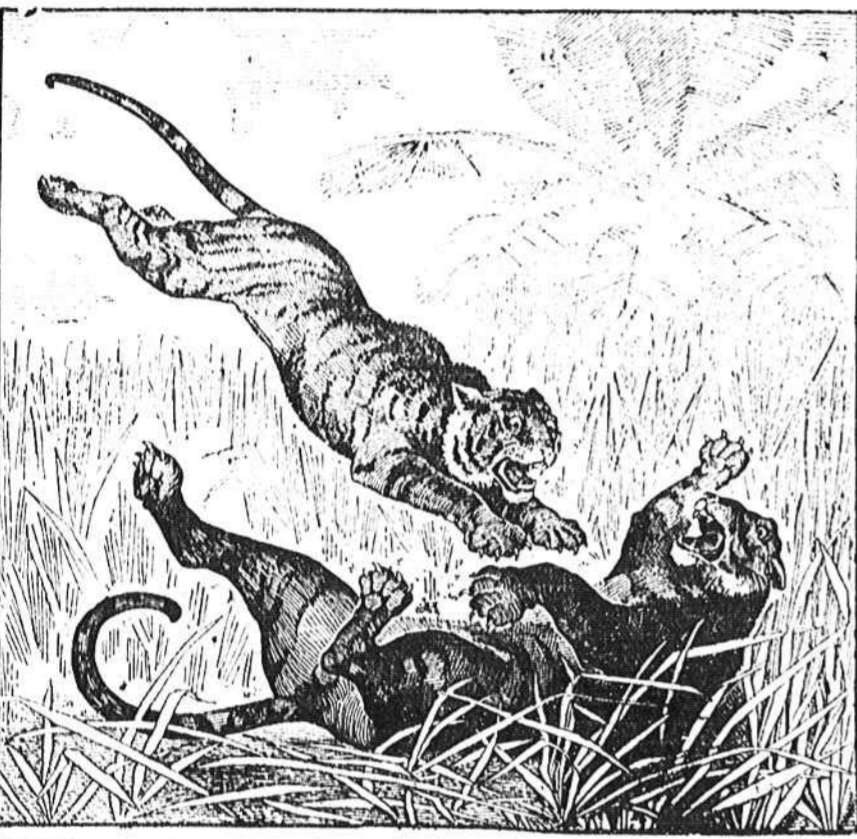

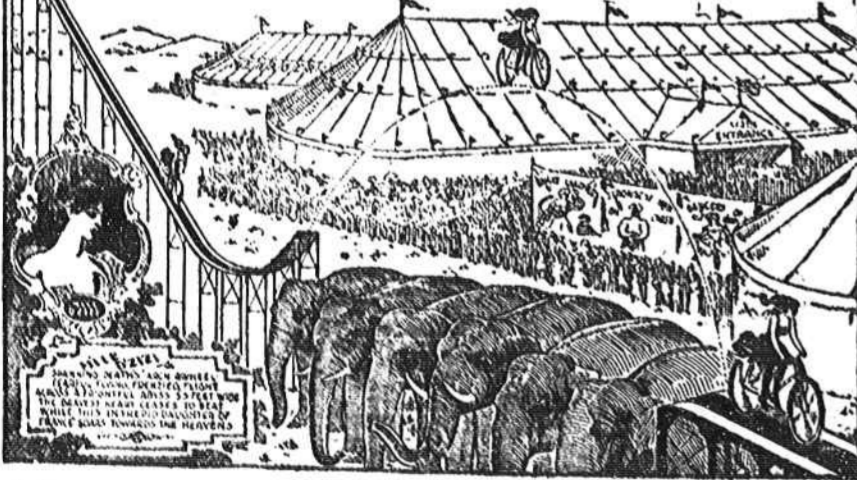

### E. B. WESLEY DEAD.

Blue Ridge Bonds—A Millionaire Who Never Smoked, Drank or Attended a Theatrical Performance.

E. B. Wesley, who died in New York, Wednesday, is well known in this state because of his persistent efforts to force the recognition and payment of the Blue Ridge bonds, of which he held a very large amount. These were issued in Radical times, but were repudiated after white people regained control of affairs.

Numerous suits and various technical actions have been taken to force the issue and the bonds have been before state and federal courts in many phases, but as yet the state has won in every instance. The court of last resort has not been reached, but it is not known whether his heirs will continue the effort to enforce payment or not.

Mr. Wesley was known in Wall street as the "oldest American speculator."

The New York American says of him: Edward B. Wesley, regarded as the oldest of American speculators, died yesterday at his country mansion at Portchester on the sound, of heart disease. He leaves an estate valued at about \$3,000,000.

Almost up to the day of his death he had looked after his business affairs, and made daily trips to Manhattan. Last week he attended a meeting of the directors of the Union Trust company, of which he was one of the founders. At the time of his death he was in his ninety-seventh year.

Mr. Wesley started his business career selling birch beer when a boy to a crowd of persons that had gathered at his birthplace at Lester, Mass., to see General Lafayette pass by. He made \$2, and with this money he walked to New York and landed there in 1825.

At a salary of \$8 a week he began speculating in fish, and from that he branched off in the financial world. He numbered among his associates in trading in notes Commodore Vanderbilt, Russell Sage and Jay Gould. He often said that he laid the foundation of his success to the fact that he had never smoked, chewed or drunk in his life, and he said he had never been in a theatre. His fortune will be inherited by his only daughter, Mrs. Ida Breck, of Mount Vernon.

### A Tribute to The Dog.

Had he said some certain dog was as "treacherous as a man" he would have given the dog a very bad name indeed, and we could have understood that the beast ranked even lower in the scale than the pariah. But when he reverses the term and says the man was as treacherous as a dog we object and say that Mr. McCutcheon doesn't know dogs. A cat is treacherous, but a dog never, for there cannot be treacherous without lying and the dog is never a liar. He may be a fool, but he is truthful. Sometimes he will bark up the wrong tree, but that is an error of judgment and not a deliberate intent to deceive. He gets the wrong scent and follows it, and leads his master astray, but the error is of the head and not the heart.

The dog has many human weaknesses, but lying is not one of them and treachery is as far from his nature as the antipodes. He may be vicious, a thief, lazy, ill-tempered and thoroughly despicable; he may be frisky, affectionate, dependable and tenacious of purpose; he may be brave or a coward, intelligent or dull, noisy or quiet, but he never tries to fool anybody about any of it. He talks with his tail as well as his mouth, and in a language that any person who knows dogs at all can readily understand.

Much that has been written about the eternal constancy and love of a dog is tommyrot. It doesn't take a dog a great while to transfer his affections from an old master to a new one, and no dog ever dies of a broken heart outside of fiction. But so long as a dog remains in close association with a master he is faithful to him under all circumstances and never tries to lie to him. It is merely to be wished that the man never lied to the dog and that the masters were as uniformly truthful as their four-footed friends. A dog may turn upon his master, but it is always under provocation and not by stealth or treachery. A dog doesn't smile (with his tail) and then bite. ### AN ORDINANCE.

Fixing the Rate and prescribing the Time for the Payment of Town Taxes for the fiscal year 1906.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, S. C., council assembled and by authority of the same:

That for the purpose of raising a revenue and in the exercise of the taxing power of said Town, the following taxes are hereby levied for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1906, upon all real and personal property within the corporate limits of said Town (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of this state) upon the valuation thereof as assessed for taxation for the county and state purposes viz:

Section I. That a tax of Sixty cents on each one hundred dollars worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry, in the State of South Carolina (Except such as is exempt from taxation under the constitution and laws of this State) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to defray the ordinary expense of said Town for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1906.

Section II. That a tax of three-fourths of a mill on each dollar's worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to defray the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the Opera House.

Section III. That a tax of two and a half mills on each dollar's worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and

laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to pay the interest on and create a sinking fund for the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the water works and electric lights plant.

Section IV. That a tax of one mill on each dollar's worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the constitution and laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the sewerage system.

Section V. That all taxes herein imposed or levied shall be paid to the said Town in lawful money of the United States, between the fifteenth day of October, 1906, and fifteenth day of November, 1906, and a penalty of ten per cent is hereby imposed upon, and shall be added to, all taxes in arrears.

Section VI. That execution issue according to law for the collection of all taxes, fines, or penalties past due and unpaid for fifteen days, and cost of said execution.

Done and ratified under the corporate seal of the Town of Newberry, in the State of South Carolina, this third day of October A. D. 1906.

### TAX NOTICE.

The tax books for Newberry county will be open for collection of taxes for fiscal year commencing January 1st, 1906, the 15th day of October, 1906, and will remain open without penalty until the 31st day of December, 1906. Upon all taxes paid after the 31st day of December, 1906, and before the 1st day of February, 1907, a penalty of one per cent will be added; upon all taxes paid during the month of Feb., 1907, a penalty of one the fifteenth day of March, 1907, inclusive an additional penalty of five per cent will be added.

The following is the levy:  
For State purposes . . . . . 5 mills.  
For ordinary county purposes 3 1-2 mills.  
For constitutional school purposes 3 mills.  
For court house . . . . . 1-2 mill.  
For Dispensary . . . . . 1-2 mill  
For back indebtedness . . 1-2 mill.

Total . . . . . 13 mills.  
Except in the following localities, where an additional railroad tax has been levied viz:  
Township No. 1 . . . . . 2 mills  
Township No. 8 . . . . . 2 1-2 mills  
Township No. 9 . . . . . 3 mill  
And except in the following school districts where special school tax has been levied, namely:  
Newberry school district No. 1. 3 mills  
Chappells school district No 39 mills.

- Big Creek school district No 20. 2 mills.
- Utopia school district No. 10. 2 mills.
- Whitmire school district No. 52. 4 mills.
- Prosperity school district No 14. 4 1-4 mills.
- Little Mountain school district No. 30. 3 mills.
- Excelsior school district No. 35. 2 mills.
- Zion school district No. 56. 2 mills.
- Pomaria school district No. 26 1-2 mills.

A poll tax of \$1.00 has been levied on all male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years, except those exempt by law.

A tax of 50 cents each levied on all dogs.

Persons liable to road duty may pay a commutation tax of \$3.00 from the 15th day of March, 1907.
