

MISPLACING OF CROSSON BILL.

Governor's Secretary Makes an Explanation—Dispensary Committee to Meet March 6.

Columbia, Feb. 27.—Both houses of the general assembly are making time, awaiting the three-day limit to expire on all acts passed after they have been placed in the hands of the governor, and they are determined to take no chances on matters which they have passed not becoming law. To this end both houses are having prepared a list of all acts delivered to the governor, the date of delivery, the ones sent to the Secretary of State, those signed and those unsigned. This list will probably be furnished tomorrow, and it is possible that final adjournment may be reached tomorrow night, although this is to be decided later. Several acts were on Monday sent to the Secretary of State unsigned, and that these may become law this session the legislature will have to sit Thursday. The only vetoed measure remaining to be disposed of is that of Senator Sullivan's telephone bill. The Anderson senator will call this matter up tomorrow night in the senate and move for its passage over the veto if a quorum is present.

Crosson Bill.

The general assembly was held over this, the eighth week, largely on account of the failure to find the Crosson bill, providing for the winding up of the affairs of the late State dispensary in the Secretary of State's office on Saturday night. The report came from the governor's office that the bill had been sent to the Secretary of State Saturday, unsigned, but a search failed to locate it. The receipt of the assistant clerk of the senate showed that the measure had been delivered to the governor on Friday morning, and when this information was conveyed to the senate an executive session was called and the legislature decided to remain over this week.

Bill Misplaced.

Mr. Alex Rowland, the governor's private secretary, had delivered a large number of bills to the Secretary of State on Saturday and he was under the impression that the Crosson bill was among them. However, he found on looking among his receipts Saturday that there was none there for this bill from the Secretary of State. Searching among the effects in the office Monday he discovered the Crosson resolution under some requisition papers. He stated that he had a large number of bills on his desk Saturday which he took over to the Secretary of State, among these had been the Crosson act, but it slipped off his desk and into the drawer where the requisition papers stay, the drawer being right under where the large number of bills were placed on his desk. On discovering where it had been misplaced he at once took it across to the Secretary of State. He thought he took it there with the big batch Saturday and was surprised when it was stated that it was not there. Of course, this matter created a good deal of talk and comment and the above is the explanation as given to the News and Courier correspondent.

Committee Meets March 6.

The legislative committee which is to probe into the affairs of the late State dispensary, will not hold the first meeting tomorrow as intended but will one week from tomorrow, which will be March 6. This statement was made here tonight by Representative Evans, secretary of the committee, in response to an inquiry. The prolonging of the session of the general assembly is the cause of the postponement of the meeting.

Short Session of Senate.

The senate held another short session today, lasting only ten minutes, and adjourned until tomorrow at 1.15 p. m. Before doing so, however, they adopted a concurrent resolution offered by Senator Christensen instructing the clerks of the senate and house to furnish the Secretary of State, a certified copy of the Senate and House Journals of the session of this year. The resolution was ordered sent to the house.

Senator Hall wanted the senate to meet tonight at 8 o'clock, at which hour the house was in session, but the majority opposed this, Senator Weston stating there had been an understanding that the adjournment would not be reached before Wednesday or Thursday, and offered as a substitute that when the senate adjourn it adjourn to meet tomorrow at 1.15 p. m. Then on motion of Senator Young the senate adjourned.

"THINK IT OVER."

Governor Replies to Editorial Paragraph in the News and Courier.

Columbia, Feb. 27.—An editorial in the News and Courier this morning, suggesting that it was possible Governor Blease would not be in the race this summer, brought forth the following statement from the governor:

"Columbia, S. C., Feb. 27, 1912.

"My attention has been called to a paragraph in the morning News and Courier, saying: 'Strange things are happening politically. It is entirely possible that Governor Blease may decide not to stand for re-election. Think it over.'"

The editor of the News and Courier may think it over, and think it over again, but the last thought he will have coming to him will be on the night of the primary, when he will find that I was reelected by a larger majority than I received in 1910. The only thing that would keep me from being a candidate for reelection as governor would be death; and his mind will have to get up some other folly in order to get the people to doubt as to whether or not I will be in the race."

"Strong Sentiment For Harmon," Says Governor Blease.

Washington, Feb. 26.—The Harmon presidential headquarters in Washington today gave out the following statement which had been received from Governor Blease, of South Carolina:

"While it is true that the Woodrow family, closely allied to Governor Wilson, are highly respected and influential in South Carolina, there is a strong sentiment here for Governor Harmon. We expect to send an un-instructed delegation to Baltimore, but it will be a delegation friendly to the Ohio governor."
