Grant's staff were also present; in fact, all were present, and were presented to Gen. Lee and Col. Marshall, and had a short conversation before they proceeded to business.

This ended, Gen. Lee returned to his army, to be met by his men in tears at the surrender. Gen. Lee's short address to them is well known, and it is useless to repeat it here.

Several members of the Army of Northern Virginia have recently purported to give accounts of the surrender, but there are silght errors in these accounts.
