

WILLIE GRUBER DIES AFTER CHRISTMAS EVE JOY RIDE

Two Companions Arrested on Charge Assault With Intent to Kill—No Suspicion of Evidence of Foul Play

The county court house was filled to capacity on Tuesday evening to hear the testimony at the inquest on the dead body of Willie Gruber.

Geo. Thomas and William Lovern, two young men who had been on a joy ride with Willie Gruber on Christmas eve had been arrested on the charge of assault and battery with intent to kill and were held in jail awaiting the result of the inquest of Willie Gruber.

There was not even a suspicion of evidence to show even the slightest intention of foul play and the verdict of the jury was correct, that they did not know what caused the death.

The stomach was not sent for analysis as it was ascertained that the state had no arrangement for the analysis and the only way it could be done would be to send it to a private laboratory and as the cost was so much it was not sent.

Magistrate Douglas called the court to order promptly at 6 o'clock and announced that the jury had been empaneled in the morning and had viewed the body of Willie Gruber.

The first witness called was Lathie Cousins. He said he was in his garage on Sunday afternoon when a car came along and as it passed the front of his home Geo. Thomas one of the passengers threw up his hands and said, "We are riding ain't we?"

Several other witnesses were sworn as to the wreck and they said about the same as Mr. Cousins.

From the testimony it seems that Mr. Thomas drove his Ford in with Mr. Lovern and left Willie Gruber out by the road until he could go back for him being unable to bring them both in at the same time.

PROF. W. S. MORRISON BURIED WEDNESDAY

One of Oldest Members of Clemson College Faculty Dies Suddenly

Clemson College, Dec. 26.—William Shannon Morrison, professor of history and economics at Clemson college for 39 years, since the institution was organized, died suddenly at his home here on Christmas night at midnight of heart failure after an illness of only 20 minutes.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Nancy Corde Morrison, four daughters, Misses Nannie, Margaret, Rose and Willie Mary, and one son, W. Austin, all of whom were home for the Christmas holidays.

Funeral services will be held at the family residence here at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday afternoon and burial will be in the Old Stone church cemetery near here.

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INCREASED PENSIONS FOR CIVIL WAR VETERANS

Washington, Dec. 19.—Veterans of the Civil war, widows of veterans and civil war nurses probably will receive Christmas presents from the government in the form of increased pensions as the result of an agreement reached by conferees on the Bureau pension bill.

The bill was passed by the senate last summer and by the house at the recent special session. Slight differences between the two houses have been compromised and the author of the bill, Senator Bursum, of New Mexico, Republican, announced today that he hoped to obtain final congressional action and the presidential signature before Christmas.

Pensions of veterans are increased under the measure from \$50 to \$72 a month, widows' pensions from \$30 to \$50 and nurses pensions from \$30 to \$50.
