The schooner, although damaged signalled that she was in no danger. Both vessels remained at the scene until daylight, when the extent of the injuries sustained by each was learned. The hole in the side of the Juniata was found to be five feet above the water lice.

Sunday night, Sept. 17, about 8 o'clock, about two miles below Honea Path, in Abbaville county, Allen Pendleton, colored, stabbed Jas. Moore, a young white man to death.
