building, of which there are several, are of the design of a hundred years ago. The structure was built by Capt. Richard Haynsworth. Mr. Plowden is not only a good farmer, but he enjoys the chase and he has a pack of the best Walker pack hounds in the State of South Carolina. As a successful planter Mr. Plowden can hit the trail having raised this year about 1,500 pounds of tobacco which brought him about \$3,000. He also grew about 30 bales of cotton and 1,200 bushels of corn. He has resided in the present location for the last 45 years.

Not only is Mrs. Plowden a school teacher but she is interested in farming having a tract of land containing 300 acres, 125 acres of which are mostly into pasture. Nevertheless, her broad acres produced about 1,200 pounds of tobacco this season. She has a beautiful home where she has lived for a number of years.

Plowdens Are Pioneer Settlers.

Nine miles east of Manning I. V. Plowden resides on a 2,300 acre farm, 200 acres of which he conducts, the balance being tenanted. This year he will produce about 75 bales of cotton, 3,000 bushels of corn and 500 bushels of oats. He was successful in raising about \$1,000 worth of tobacco which will add materially to the revenues of the season's business.

Mr. Plowden is another up-to-date planter who has learned the wisdom of diversified farming and has no apprehensions in any year lest he will make good with at least a portion of his crops and come out at the end of the year with a good showing to the right side of the ledger. Among the live stock are 10 mules, 50 hogs, 30 head of cattle and, in the poultry, a number of well bred chickens. Large crops of peaches and apples are grown here. Good buildings and a large conveniently arranged house are among the valuable assets of this plantation. The pioneers of the Plowdens' came to this section of the country about 175 years ago and the large and well cultivated plantations of their descendants attest the frugality and industry of those pioneers in the land which is being emulated by their descendants.

J. F. and D. F. Tobias.

Among the sturdy planters in this section may be mentioned J. F. Tobias and his son, D. F. Tobias, who came to this section and settled where they have lived for the past 50 years. While they have not been quite so

successful as some of the planters yet they have made a reputation for honesty, frugality and diligence in their field of labor and they have gained an enviable reputation in the community for their sterling character and uprightness.

Tea May Be Grown to Profit About Here.

That the soil, climate and other conditions in this locality are quite favorable for the cultivation of the tea plant has been conclusively demonstrated. Mrs. John Herriot, wife of Magistrate John Herriot, has grown two tea plants which, the past season, yielded one-half pound of tea of the finest quality. The writer was given a branch of one of the plants which was in bloom and also contained several buds. The tea plant is a hardy shrub and it is quite possible and not improbable that the plant could be successfully grown in this section to a profit. It might not be outside the inevitable to predict that the growing of the tea plant in commercial quantities will become a reality in the near future in this section.

In all sections wherever a ginnyery or oil mill is located there it will be found that the people are hitting up a pace, it matters not whether it is the planter awaiting his turn to dispose of his cotton and secure his check, or the ones inside the plants who are rushing machinery and men to handle the large output from the fertile fields of this section of South Carolina. And it all portends big money and prosperous times for all concerned.

invested in mules employed on this plantation where 15 plows are operated is no small item when it is considered there are 20 to 25 head besides a number of horses. Of other live stock there are from 10 to 15 head of cattle and 75 head of hogs. Large amounts of peaches are grown as the soil is very favorable to the production of this fruit. Besides peaches and apples Mr. Timmons has a pecan orchard which has done fairly well this season. Five hundred cans of peaches have already been placed in stock. Practically all the farming is conducted with latest improved machinery. Among the numerous buildings on the place, all of which are in a good condition is a fine, substantial 10 room house. Mr. Timmons has resided in this location for the past ten years and in that time has proven himself an intelligent, conservative planter.

Sunnyside Farm.

Just east of Manning one reaches a typical Southern home and one of nature's beauty spots. Inclosed on the south and east sides by a tastily trimmed California privet hedge are bowers of flowers, practically all the tropical fruits and plants while standing in bold relief to the beautiful surroundings is a modern seven room house of neat architectural design where, among the other conveniences pure artesian water is provided throughout the place. Included in this tract which is owned by F. P. Ervin, are 20 acres five of which are devoted to the pasturage of the three full blooded Jerseys, which provide milk from which the richest cream and finest butter are produced. Corn, velvet beans, table peas, soy beans including all kinds of garden truck, cabbage, turnips, lettuce, tomatoes and parsley are grown in abundance. Three Satsuma orange trees supply this delectable fruit, Kiefer pears, plums, figs, peaches and grapes being among the collection of fruit produced here. Grapes are to be had during the months of June, August,

September, October and November. Mrs. Ervin, who is president of the poultry association, justly takes pride in her fowls of which she has at present 47 pullets and 18 hens. The Ervins have resided here for the past 14 years and have successfully demonstrated that a vast variety of fruits, shrubs and plants, even those of the colder climates, can be successfully grown here by confining with nature and observing closely its immutable laws when tilling the soil. **Farmer Who Loves His Dogs—House Built 100 Years Ago.**

H. A. Plowden, who owns a 200 acre tract of land 200 acres of which are under cultivation, resides in one of the typical antebellum houses which, in all probability, is 100 years old and is now in perfect state of development. 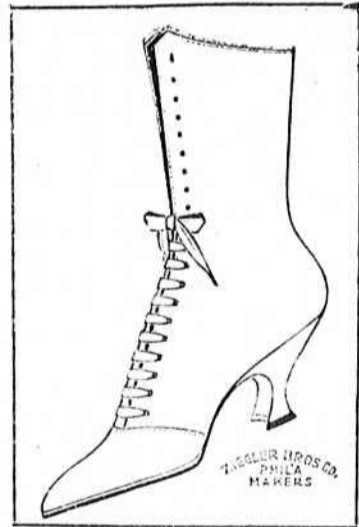
