DEATH OF MR. IRVIN PLOWDEN

Last Saturday morning this community was shocked to learn that Mr. Irvin V. Plowden was dead. Mr. Plowden returned home Friday evening from a hunt near Charleston feeling fine, and on retiring that night remarked that he felt better than usual. About four o'clock his wife heard him groaning and went to his bedside, but it was too late to revive him, as he was breathing his last. The deceased had suffered spells with his heart, but at this time he seemed to be in better health than usual. Mr. Plowden was one of Clarendon's wealthiest and best citizens. He was a noted hunter and participated in many trap shoots in this and other States. He is survived by a widow and two daughters. The funeral took place at Brewington cemetery Sunday morning before a very large concourse of relatives and friends.
