

MUST LOOK AFTER OUR OWN INTERESTS, SAYS BORAH.

Washington, Dec. 1.—In a long statement made in Washington yesterday, Senator Borah of Idaho deplored the fact that our authorities have been so tremendously occupied with foreign affairs that they have not had the time to attend to affairs of the most pressing importance at home. Senator Borah said in part:

"It is time to look after the interests and welfare of our own people. We have been deluged with propaganda for months as to our duty to other peoples. It is now time to give the American people consideration. They have been wholly neglected thus far ever since the war began. Our industrial and economic conditions have therefore reached a point where they demand our first consideration. It is becoming a little bit nauseating to be told of our continued obligation to other people, with never a word for the interests of our own people, some of whom are very sorely in need of attention.

CHEAPER METHOD OF GUN CONSTRUCTION DEvised

Washington, Dec. 1.—According to Rear Admiral Ralph Earle, Chief of Ordnance, whose annual report was made public several days ago, a new method of gun construction for the navy promises economy in both time and cost. "Radial expansion" by hydraulic pressure to obtain the necessary adherent strength, or elasticity, in the "built up" weapons is the basis of the new plan. It will reduce the number of sections in the guns as compared to the heat shrinking process, the report states, and can be applied to guns up to six-inch rifles, but it has not been worked out for heavy weapons.

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CLEMENCEAU URGED TO VISIT AMERICA.

Paris, Dec. 1.—An article in "La Presse De Paris," printed recently, urges Premier Clemenceau to visit the United States. The article says in part:
"There are not only French people, but American as well, who would be glad to see Clemenceau take a steamship and go over there on a mission in the interests of our alliance."
"He is today the only European statesman whom America places on a pinnacle. In him is incarnated victorious France. His age commands respect. The habit has formed of throwing himself upon the enemy, interior or exterior, is a habit which appeals to the American people. Speaking English, he can appeal to the greatest audience across the sea."

RAILROAD CONFERENCE ENDS; NO STRIKE VOTE

The meeting of 500 General Chairmen of the four great railroad brotherhoods which began in Cleveland last Monday to consider the offer of Director General Hines of time and one-half for overtime in slow freight service, provided all arbitrations and special allowances were eliminated, ended late yesterday with the adoption of a resolution to send a com-

mittee, including the four chiefs, and representing all four organizations, to Washington to confer with Mr. Hines.

A telegram has been sent asking for a conference on Tuesday Dec. 2. The convention accepted Mr. Hine's proposal that the pay of train and engine crews will automatically start at the expiration of sixteen hours from the time of release at away-from-home terminals.

No strike vote was taken during the conference, according to W. G. Lee, President of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

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KING VICTOR EMMANUEL TO VISIT AMERICA.

Washington, Dec. 1.—A dispatch from Rome states that King Victor Emmanuel will visit the United States next Summer, and that he will also visit a number of South American countries, including Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, and Peru, unless his plans are interfered with by the political situation in Italy. The report says that the King will be accompanied by Premier Nitti, Victor Emmanuel, it is stated, is particularly desirous of returning the visit President Wilson made to him at Rome some time ago.

London, Dec. 1.—The injured right eye of William E. "Pussyfoot" Johnson, the American prohibition worker and organizer, was removed in London recently. The physician in attendance explained in a bulletin issued after the operation that removal of the eye was necessary to save the left eye and also that the pain could not have been relieved otherwise.

Mr. Johnson's eye was injured on Nov. 13, at London when he was dragged from a platform by students, while he was making a prohibition speech, and paraded through various streets.

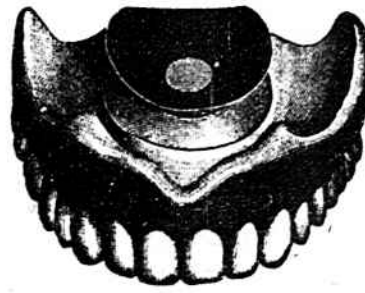
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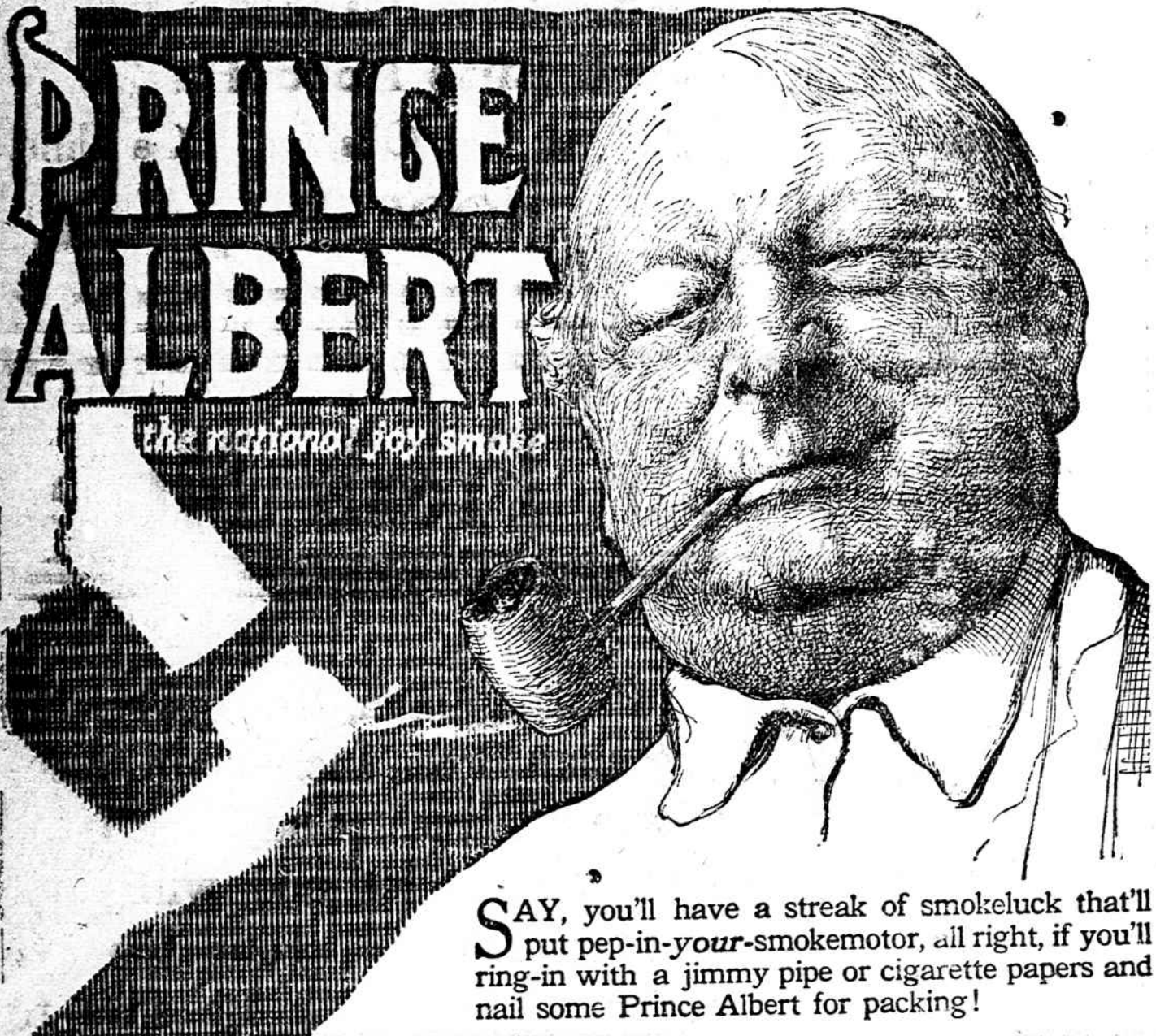
