GAME WARDEN APPEALS FOR STRICT ENFORCEMENT

Joe M. Caughman, county game warden for Lexington County, is in receipt of the following letter from Wade Hampton Gibbes, chief game warden of South Carolina. A copy of this letter has been sent to all game wardens. The letter is as follows:

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 13, 1919.

To all Game Wardens:
Now that the boll weevil is here it becomes doubly important to protect our insectivorous birds in the interest of our farmers and diversified agriculture.

Well have these birds been termed the "Polloemen of the Air," and without them we would be overwhelmed with noxious weeds and loathsome insects.

If parents will not train their children to spare our robins, sparrows, warblers, blue birds, bull bats, swallows, martins, fly catchers and other feathered friends they force us to have them arrested and tried by our magistrates, and then the fine will have to be paid by the really responsible party.

Be firm in enforcing this law just as strictly as the game laws themselves.

The penalty is provided under section 739. In enforcing our game, bird and fish laws you are performing a real service to your State and Nation.
