A Big Tobacco Warehouse Deal.

One of the biggest deals in warehouse circles that has ever been consummated in Mullins, was pulled off last week, whereby C. O. Dixon, formerly of Planters warehouse, became an equal partner with J. S. Neal, of Farmers warehouse. Their successful career in Mullins as warehousemen is too well-known to need any comment. As soon as Mr. Dixon acquired an interest in Farmers warehouse, they at once went to work enlarging their house by adding on about 7,000 feet of floor space, making their sales floor the largest and best adapted for the purpose in the State. Those who know them feel confident that they will need every foot of the building, too, for they each have their individual trade and an ordinary house would not accommodate them both. The extension covers almost the entire front of their lot along Laurel street, and will be the largest roof ever built in Mullins. We are glad to see their continued faith in our tobacco market, and the heavy expenditure of money that they are putting

Out shows their foresight in preparing for the big trade that they undoubtedly will get. It will be one of the strongest business firms ever established in our town. It has been estimated that these two gentlemen, in the dealings with the tobacco growers last year, paid out more money than the combined capital stock of the banks of Horry and Marion counties. That is a broad statement, but their books will show it to be correct. Thus we see what this strong firm means to our town. Since Mr. Dixon withdrew from Planters warehouse, he has received a large number of flattering propositions from Kentucky and Virginia to go into the tobacco warehouse business, but he has faith in Mullins as a growing town and market, and wisely decided to launch in the business here on a broader scale than ever before. Mullins is to be congratulated with having such a strong team of warehousemen. And the farmers who have dealt with C. O. Dixon and J. S. Neal for the past six or eight years, know full well they have friends in them that they depend on at all times and under all rea-

sonable circumstances. Their interests are studied by these gentlemen, and every precaution taken to safe-guard them. Watch them go after the trade this summer.—Mullins Enterprise.

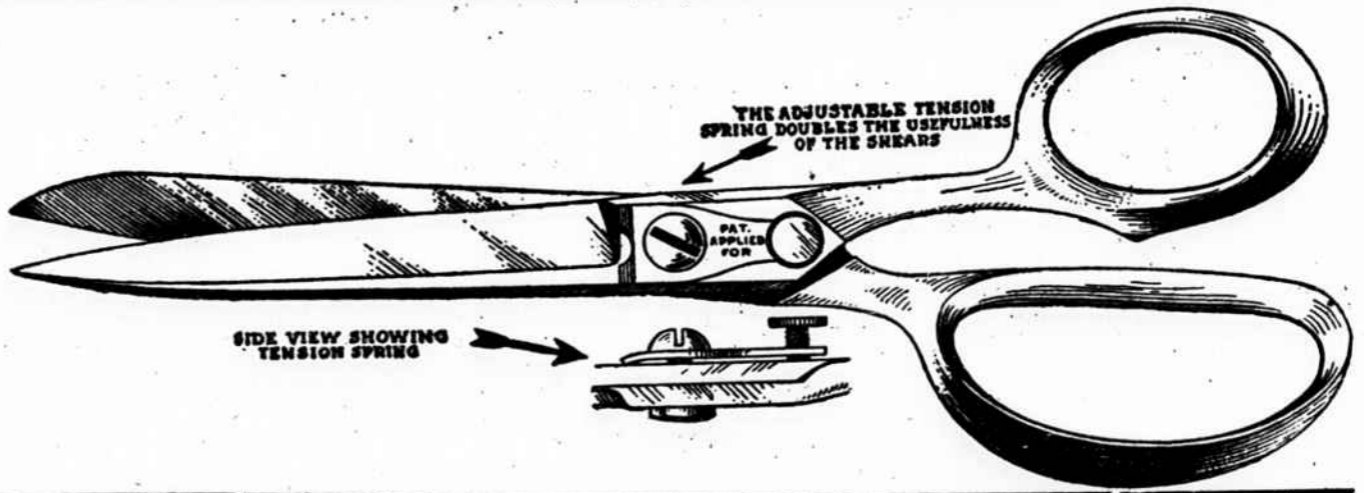

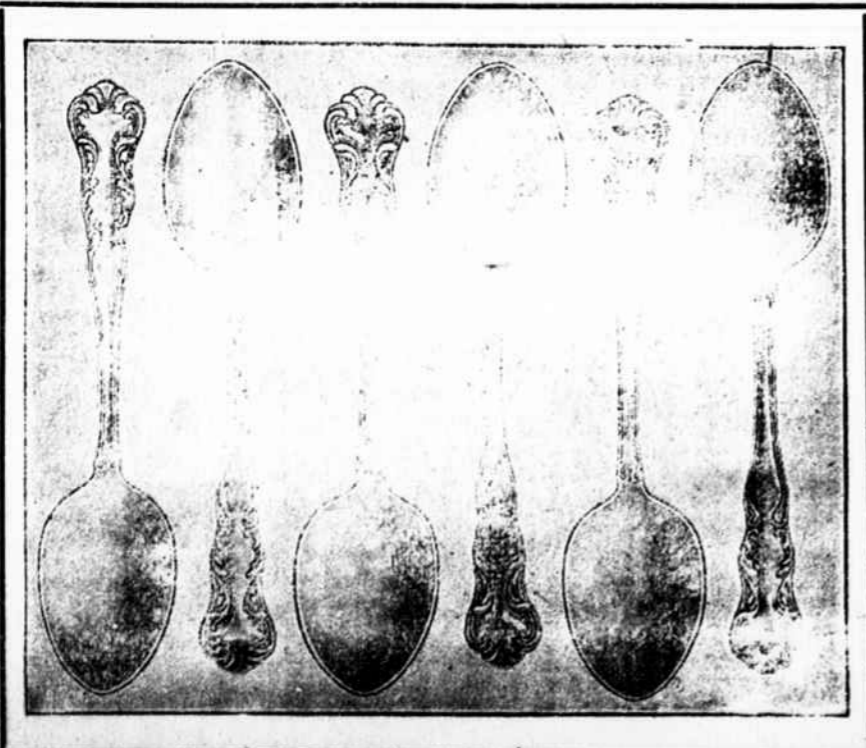
