Dillon was paying more for cotton Saturday than any town in this part of the state. Cotton was taken as fast as it came in at 12.52 1/2 while the limit in other towns was 12 1/4. Cotton seed sold at 33 cents the bushel and the market is still strong.

So far as can be learned Dillon was the only town in the State that paid 12-52 1/2 for cotton on Saturday, the 4th. instant. The average in other towns was about 12.35. Although the price of cotton has declined, the limits of the Dillon buyers are still high as compared with other towns and if you want the top-notch price for your cotton bring it to the Dillon market.
