Marion county 905 square miles! This information was received from Columbia just before going to press yesterday afternoon. Prof Colcock's survey shows that the old county contains 501 square miles and the new county contains 404 square miles. This settles the question of area and the new county comes within the constitutional limits. It is likely the governor will order the election within 20 days.

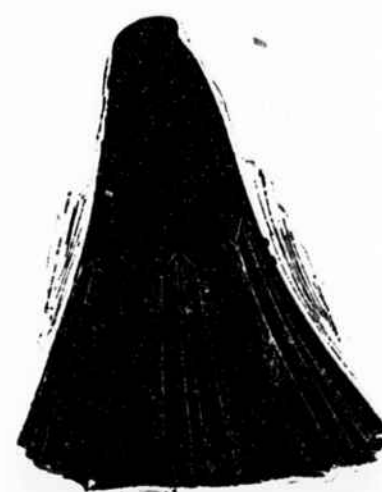
