**A Trip to Cumberland Hills.**

Fayetteville, N. C., can boast more hills than ancient Rome. It is claimed, yet void of its bloody history. Here before the north and the south battled for supremacy the writer, then a student at the then popular school of Cotton, on the Cape Fear, found this town his first visit. Since then the old town that nestled among her many hills has been his home. Her Rip Van Winkle dream has assumed an aggressive character that has modernized her field of her possibilities. Her progress and enterprise in her public buildings, her parks and the many attractive points of view are an infallible sign that she is a happy and prosperous people. Last week, accompanied by Dr. J. P. Ewing, of (I came here saying Dillon,) but since the trip out to his extensive holdings a few miles from Fayetteville, I have placed him among the migratory class of bipeds and will admit that old Cumberland county is an undisputed right to claim him as one of her progressive farmers.

Leaving Fayetteville by what is known as the old Yaddin road, on our right and left as we journeyed on was a succession of attractive homes, some of them almost palatial in their proportions, others wherein taste and art had exhausted itself, changing those once bleak hills into a scene of beauty that thrills with honest pride the heart of every true southerner.

Jogging along up one hill and down another, the Doctor expatiating on the fine roads, elegant homes and the thrift of the up-to-date farmers where for miles the evidence was unmistakable, the fields of dew berries and English peas which had netted their owners as much as \$125 per acre. On reaching the crest of the hill, away down 30 feet below was his dwelling and barns in a grove of grand old hickories, oaks, pines, dog woods and towering hollies. **TAX COLLECTOR'S NOTICE.**

COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE, }  
Marion, S. C. Sept. 10, 1909. }  
The books for collection of State, County and Road Tax will be open from Oct. 15, 1909, to Dec. 31, 1909, those who prefer to do so can pay State and County taxes in January, 1910, with 1 per cent additional; those who prefer paying in February, 1910, can do so with 2 per cent additional; those who prefer paying in March, 1910, to the 15th of said month, can do so by paying an additional 7 per cent. (After said date the books will close.)  
Road Tax can be paid during the fall but if those liable prefer doing so, they can pay the road tax during January, and February. The commutation tax is \$2 for 1910.  
Taxpayers owning property or paying tax for others will please ask for a tax receipt in each township or Special School district in which he or they own property. This is very important as there are so many School Districts.  
Those who do not wish to come to the office can write me (not

later than December 25th) and I will furnish them; the amount due and they can remit me by check, money order, registered letter.  
Please do not send me cash without registering same, as it is liable to be at sender's risk.
