**Employers are Liable**

It is not generally known that em-  
ployers must send to the govern-  
ment before March 1st the names of  
all persons in their employ who are  
paid salaries of \$800 or more during  
the year. This feature of the in-  
come tax law has been overlooked.  
If you have a farm overseer who is  
receiving in money or supplies \$800  
or more per year the overseer's  
name must be sent to the Collector  
of Internal Revenue at Washington.  
Failure to comply with this feature  
of the income tax law is punishable  
by fine or imprisonment.

Deputy Collector Jenks spent

ing people in making out income tax  
returns. Mr. Jenks says it will  
take a week to make out all the in-  
comes in Dillon county and that he  
will write Collector Heyward to

make out their incomes before March  
1st.

**Examinations Resumed**

Physical examinations were resumed  
yesterday by the Local Board of  
Exemption and will be continued un-  
til the 1852 registered men in the  
county have been examined. The ex-  
aminations began on the 29th ultimo,  
but orders were received from Wash-  
ington suspending the examinations  
until the new regulations as to exam-  
inations were received.

The new rules are more stringent  
and the percentage of discharges will  
be greatly reduced. One physician's  
interpretation of the new rules is that  
only the maimed, the halt and the  
blind will escape. Under the selective  
draft the government has created a  
new department known as "limited  
service." This means that a person  
physically unable to bear arms will be  
given work that he can perform, such  
as clerical work, messenger duty,  
mail carrier or perhaps some light  
work in the commissary department  
or mess hall. The government needs  
four men outside the trenches for  
each man in the trenches, and the  
man who cannot fight will be assign-  
ed to some department where his phys-  
ical disability will not be a handicap.
