BOXING SHOW

The card offered the fight fans for tonight is a most promising twenty-two rounds of fighting, being scheduled beside a feature Battle Royal with five negroes.

The opening bout on the card finds "Kid" Williams, 118 lbs., of Conway, fitted against Rush Marsh, 110 lbs., from Georgetown. This is the first fight in the local arena in which either of these boys have participated in. It should be a good one as both fighters are light speedsters.

The second bout finds Rupert 'Bug' Allen, 135 lbs., fighting George 'Carpenter' McCormick, in a grudge fight. These two mixed leather, fast and furious, two weeks ago, and the judges called it a draw when both fighters thought it their fight. This party will predict Allen winner by a small margin, and further that this bout will be one of the best on the card.

In the Semi-final tilt 'Jumping' Joe Johnson, 130 pounder, of Conway, will mix with Ed Mercer, 134 pounder of Andrews. Mercer is a newcomer to the local arena and is reported to be a good fighter. Jumping Joe will have his hands full if reports are true, but local fans think Johnson will take the decision.

The feature bout finds 'Batling' Ed Andersen, 140 lbs, the pride of Conway, swapping punches with Whaley Barrineau, 134 lbs, of Andrews. Anderson has won his last three fights here; two of these being knock-outs. Andersen is a hard hitter and a good boxer. In Barrineau, the fans will see one of the most finished fighters that has ever entered the ring here. Weighing only 134 pounds, Barrineau packs a mean wallop, and is a very clever and accurate puncher. This bout should be well worth the money as plenty of action is promised in these six rounds.

Ralph Wilson and Staff Alford, both colored, will fight the additional bout.

The public's favorite—a battle royal with five big blacks, completes the card. These Battle Royals have proven most entertaining and amusing and draw forth much applause from the gallery.

The new stands are in place, there is room for all, and the American Legion invites you to be present tonight (Thursday) to witness the final and best card yet offered.

After the final show here tonight, the ring will be moved to Myrtle Beach for the summer, where bouts will be staged weekly under the same supervision of the American Legion.
