**Crowding the Professions.**  
 Chicago, too, notices the crowding in the professions, not as something new, but as becoming intensified. It is estimated that out of a total of 4,000 lawyers in Chicago 500 are handling the litigation of the city and only about 200 are making \$5,000 or over each year. The passing of the national bankruptcy act, it is claimed, cut off a large and profitable source of revenue for lawyers. While the legitimate business of the courts has not shown any marked increase, the influx of lawyers from the country has been steadily and uninterrupted, and the stream of Blackstonians has been yearly augmented by heavy contributions from the colleges and universities. Of doctors the number in Chicago is estimated at 4,000. If the city had a population of 2,000,000 this would give a physician to every 500 inhabitants, which means that there are four or five times as many physicians as are needed.
